## OFFICIAL.

LONDON, June 11.  
The Governor, Newfoundland:

The French Government report heavy losses at Neuville; the enemy left about a thousand dead.

The Russian Government report a German attack on the Russian trenches at Moosaka in Galicia, driven back with very heavy loss. On the right bank of the Dniester, presence of the enemy resulted in the capture of two thousand prisoners and eight machine guns. A later report says important enemy forces which had crossed to the left bank of the Dniester were driven back with heavy losses the Russians capturing seventeen guns, forty-nine machine guns and about 6,700 prisoners. The Italian Government report the occupation of the citadel and heights dominating Montefalco.

## FRENCH OFFICIAL.

PARIS, June 11.  
The French War Office issued the following to-day: There is nothing of importance to add to the announcement given out last night, with the exception of further success in the Labyrinth, where we have continued to force the enemy back, and some progress to the east of the Labyrinth.

## FRENCH REPORTS.

PARIS, via St. Pierre, June 11.  
Nothing further of importance to add to yesterday's report except (1) our progress in the Labyrinth, where we have continued to throw back the enemy; (2) small advance to the east of Labyrinth, where we have taken a German position near the big road of Lias to Lille; (3) in Hebuterne region, the widening of our gains north and south of our front, and the taking of several trenches with about 100 prisoners and machine guns.

In the Dardanelles we have strengthened our gains obtained in the fighting of the 4th of June. At the extreme right in Kereve Dere region, we have further progressed, and from inquiries to prisoners these show that the enemy's losses have been very heavy.

## GERMANS REINFORCE THE WEST.

LONDON, June 11.  
An Amsterdam despatch states that the German general staff is moving a new army of 500,000 men to the western front.

## THE RUSSIAN OFFENSIVE.

PETROGRAD, June 11.  
Suddenly assuming the offensive, the Russian forces in Galicia, south of Lemberg, have defeated the Austro-German forces upon the Dniester River, capturing 6,500 men, 188 officers, 17 cannon, and 49 machine guns.

## GERMANS WELL SUPPLIED WITH MEN AND AMMUNITION.

LONDON, June 11.  
The Daily Mail's correspondent at Petrograd telegraphs that in addition to one million German troops pressing towards Lemberg, from the west, there are 300,000 moving against the Dniester line in the hope of attacking the city simultaneously from the south. He calls attention to the

## BULGARIA SENDS PROTEST TO TURKEY.

LONDON, June 11.  
The Bulgarian Government, says a Bucharest despatch to the Times, has sent a strongly worded protest to Turkey because of the continued interference of that country regarding traffic on the Dedegatch railway and detention of passengers and freight.

## ITALIAN FORCES CAPTURE BLOK-KEN.

INNBRUCK, June 11.  
Italian forces have captured Ploeken in Austria, close to the frontier. The possession of this location is important, as it endangers the Austrian communications. Ploeken is 15 miles south of the main highway between Salzburg and Innsbruck. An announcement has been made here by Austrians, that one of their submarines yesterday sunk a British cruiser of the Liverpool type at a point forty miles off St. Jean Medua in the Adriatic.

## AUSTRIANS EVACUATE POZZACCHIO.

MILAN, June 11.  
The Austrians are reported to have evacuated Pozzaccio after blowing up the fortress. Pozzaccio is east of the Adige River, 15 miles south of Trent. The Italians already hold Vallarsa, a mile from Pozzaccio.

## NIGHT AND DAY BOMBARDMENT.

GENEVA, June 11.  
A tremendous night and day bombardment of the Austrian forts of Santa Lucia and Santa Maria defending Tolmino, is being carried on by the Italians with heavy guns.

## IN THE DARDANELLES.

PARIS, June 11.  
An official announcement concerning the Dardanelles reads: "In the Dardanelles we have consolidated results obtained by us in the fighting of June 4th. At the right end of the Ravine of Kereve Dere we were successful with minor engagements in making some progress. Prisoners who fell into our hands confirmed previous reports that the losses of the enemy have been considerable."

## SIR W. R. NICOLL ON THE SITUATION.

LONDON, June 11.  
Where Germany could had a marked superiority in men and now has superiority in ammunition, and this

advantage she will press to its fullest. The only way for the Allies to avert disaster is to equip themselves and to do this Great Britain must stand behind David Lloyd George, Minister of Munitions, as one man. Moreover, if he is not given a free hand he may resign." Sir William Robertson Nicoll thus sums up the situation as he sees it in the current number of the British Weekly, one of the best-known journals in England.

## SERBIANS ACTIVE.

LONDON, June 11.  
A despatch from Rome says that the Serbians have occupied Titana, a town east of the Albanian seaport of Durazzo.

## VICTIMS OF A DAY.

LONDON, June 11.  
The Glasgow steamer Strathcona, Russian steamer Danila, Russian barque Thomasina, and Swedish steamer Octago were sunk by German submarines yesterday, while the British fishing smacks Welfare and Laurestina fell victims to a Zeppelin. The crews of all were saved.

## ARRESTED AT ALGERIERS, SPAIN.

PARIS, June 11.  
A despatch from Algeriers, Spain, gives details of the arrest there of the man who professed to be the commander of the German converted cruiser Prinz-Eitel-Friedrich. He shipped as cook aboard an Italian steamer bound for Genoa, intending to go from there to Germany. He was interviewed at Gibraltar masquerading under the name of Commander Thierichens.

## PROBING GERMAN TRICKERY.

NEW YORK, June 11.  
The Grand Jury investigation to determine whether there was a conspiracy to defraud the United States in connection with affidavits submitted by the German Embassy to the State Department to prove that there were guns aboard the Lusitania, begun here, is specifically directed against Paul Koenig, who, according to the authorities, is head of a secret service department, maintained by the Hamburg-American steamship line. The first result of the investigation was the arrest for perjury of Gustave Stahl, a German reservist, who made one of the affidavits submitted by the Embassy, and who is alleged to be closely associated with Koenig. The warrant alleges he committed perjury.

## REPARATION DEMANDED.

EL PASO, June 11.  
C. Myles, the British Vice-Consul, to-day telegraphed General Villa demanding punishment of Villa's soldiers responsible for the recent killing of four and wounding of one British subject at Tuxpan. The message was sent on instructions of Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, British Ambassador at Washington.

## U. S. NOTE PUBLISHED IN BERLIN.

BERLIN, June 11.  
The American note is printed in the Berlin newspapers, but is not accompanied by editorial comment. Headlines are varied, but were similar to "America stands firm." "A very solemn warning to Germany" and "very grave appeal." The note is regarded as decidedly conciliatory.

## LANSING COMPARED WITH BRYAN.

AMSTERDAM, June 11.  
A despatch from the Berlin Kolnische Volks-Zeitung, a copy of which has been received here, says: "Without doubt Lansing, in comparison with Bryan, is a man of very sharp tone. Our submarine war will not cease on this account. If American ships or Americans in British ships enter the war zone, they must, despite Lansing and President Wilson, take the risk involved on such a voyage. America can claim the right to judge neutrals' rights only when herself maintains neutrality. Such was not the case under pacifist Bryan, and will probably be just as little the case under the international law expert Lansing."

We learn with great pleasure that as a result of recommendations brought before them by a representative committee of the congregation, the Select Vestry of the C. of E. Cathedral have formulated a plan that will very materially assist the choir-master in his duties.

Choir work is arduous at the best, but especially with boys. Mr. Allen has been somewhat concerned by the difficulties of obtaining boys with promising voices.

Following out this plan, in future there will be a group of eight boys selected by Mr. Allen (29 Monkstown Road) who will be taught voice production and to read music as now, and in addition will be educated free at Bishop Field College and receive also as salary, ten dollars a year. There will be also eight probationers who will be in training and in readiness to fill any vacancy that may occur and thus have the advantage of being educated free. Boys of ten years, and upwards will be taken.

This arrangement for free schooling is a common one in England even in the small Parish Churches and the benefits accruing to parents, boys, and Church are such as to commend themselves thoroughly to all.

The benefit of a musical education with its direct use in surroundings which preclude any but the best music is an advantage which cannot be too highly estimated, whilst a College education (what otherwise might not be open to some boys) will fit the boy to breast the world when the time comes for him to leave school. Mr. Allen wants to commence work this month and hopes to have many applications, and with such inducements, we cannot but think that the results of the scheme will fully justify its existence.
