Labor Leaders Called Into Conference

on Crisis. Copenhagen, Oct. 4.-Leaders of erman labor were received at German General Headquarters this week, not to congratulate Field Marshal von Hindenburg on his birthday, as intimated at first, but to confer on means to have German workmen speed up the production of munitions.

The leaders submitted to General von Ludendorff, Chief Quartermaster General, complaints of the laboring classes, dealing especially with the compulsory labor service law. A long conference was devoted to discussing possible improvement of the conditions of labor and maintenance of the output of munitions, which Ludendorff eclared was the duty of the hour. Private reports have been received y the Associated Press that the Gernan authorities were having difficulty

n preventing a falling off in the pro lowering of the working capacity of the underfed workman and the scarcity of raw materials, notably the rarer metals used in the manufacture of high-grade steel. "Regarding the supply of raw maerials, particularly those required or the manufacture of guns and muitions, we are not dependent solely n the stock in hand, which, moreover would be sufficient. We have to produce them, and this production is oceeding satisfactorily."
