Accident Not Serious.

PLANT WILL BE RUNNING AGAIN WEDNESDAY.

A message from Supt. Judge of Grand Falls, received last evening, says that the explosion at the generating room was not serious and that the plant will be running to full capacity by Wednesday. The accident occurred at 11 o'clock Saturday night, just previous to closing down for Sunday. It is assumed that dampness caused a short circuit in the main with its equipment. There was no damage done to the building. One man named Hanaford was slightly burned but will be able to resume work in a day or two. Owing to the destruction of the switch board and its equipment the plant will be run in sections by motor power until a new switchboard and equipment is imported from Pittsburg.
