### To-day's Messages.

FROM COPENHAGEN.

COPENHAGEN, Aug. 29. Russian Bolshevik forces have recaptured Grodno says a Koenigsberg despatch to Berlingske Tidende, and the report adds that the Poles also have been forced to evacuate Bialystok.

INTERNING BOLSHIES.

PARIS, Aug. 29. Forty thousand Bolsheviks already have crossed the border, according to the Foreign Ministry, and all Bolsheviks are being interned under the direction of Allied officers.

POLISH OFFICIAL.

WARSAW, Aug. 29. Russian Soviet forces are endeavoring to drive a wedge, designed to sever the Polish front, according to an official statement on fighting operations issued just before last midnight. Violent fighting is reported north of Belzec, and to the north of Lemberg, where Soviet cavalry of General Budenny is trying a new encircling movement against Lemberg. An advanced Soviet detachment has reached Tyszwow. In the region of Boberska, twenty miles south-east of Lemberg, Poles have repulsed repeated Russian attacks intended as a drive against Lemberg. Poles are counter-attacking at Sarniki and have smashed several Soviet squadrons.

BELFAST'S HOLOCAUST.

BELFAST, Aug. 29. Eight men dead is the toll of Saturday night's fighting in Belfast. In addition to six men killed during the height of the battle, two of the wounded died to-day.

NO BACKBONE TO STRIKE.

NEW YORK, Aug. 29. The strike of Longshoremen in protest against the imprisonment of Terence MacSwiney, Lord Mayor of Cork, which began last Thursday, when two thousand workers quit, apparently has collapsed. Everything was quiet along the waterfront to-day, despite the efforts of pro Irish women pickets. No difficulty was experienced in getting men to unload incoming British ships, steamship officials said.

BROOKLYN TRAFFIC DISRUPTED.

NEW YORK, Aug. 29. Employees of the Brooklyn rapid transit system struck at five o'clock this morning, following a vote taken two hours previously, and traffic on all subway elevated and surface lines virtually was disrupted.

EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS MALTA.

LONDON, Aug. 29. The Island of Malta suffered an earthquake shock of considerable force at three o'clock this morning, says a Central News despatch from Rome, quoting advices from Syracuse, Sicily. Numerous buildings in Floriana and the surrounding district were seriously damaged, and the population was in a panic, the dispatch says.

BOLSHIEVSKI ACTIVITY.

PARIS, Aug. 29. Bolsheviks will not remain idle, although defeated, the war correspondent of L'Information quotes Gen. Romadowski, President Pilsudski's Chief of Staff, as saying Saturday. Of seventy divisions they gathered against Poland, there remain barely thirty. General Rowadowski continued, but they are organizing new armies at this moment, and are spreading fire and blood in Eastern Galicia, and arming bands of peasants. Our information justifies us in affirming that Bolsheviks are preparing a great offensive in Eastern Galicia, with fifteen new divisions, and that military operations will soon begin.

### Another Storm Cloud.

As was shown in the demonstration regarding Russia, the swing is away from moderation and patience, and the passion of the unions for public service is not always clear. —Montreal Daily Star.
