Ramsay MacDonald, forgetting his own Government's inability to produce from a hat the rabbits which they had assured us were there, could not deny himself the pleasure of moving a vote of censure on the Government for failing to grapple with unemployment -but the hard facts are such as to prevent the level-headed working man from being made a party to such shameless exploitation. Mr. Cook would, if he could, lead the miners a sorry dance in the interests of nationalisation-and the miners' recent demand for higher wages to meet the increased cost of living shows us what that would mean. It would mean, to start with, a loss of £30,000,000 a year, which would require to be made up by the taxpayer-and, after all, the industry would remain where it is! The real problem is how to reduce our pithead cost of 13s a ton to something like France's and Germany's 7s 6d, and this, of course, means a reduction in our overhead charges somewhere.
