NOTES AND COMMENTS.

The daylight saving movement is becoming more popular all the time, and it would not at all surprise us if its adoption becomes quite general before long. We see no serious objection to it, and have heard no arguments that show it would cause injury or any special inconvenience to any one. By simply advancing the hands of our clocks one hour, we could enjoy a long summer evening of daylight. What a splendid thing this would be to the working men and those confined indoors all day.

Human beings are funny animals If you do not think so, you may find an example by taking a position on Talbot Street, say on a Monday morning. After the efficient streetsweeper has carefully collected the refuse of Sunday into neat piles, you will discover that there is not one driver of a horse or auto out of ; dozen who will not go considerably out of his way to hit and scatter a least one of the dirt piles. That means extra work and extra expense to the town, and the childish practice should be stopped.

The virtual abandonment by the Germans of their attack on Verdun will be greatly discouraging to the Central Powers, and a disappointment to the German Crown Prince, who from the second month of the war, in 1914, when he was proclaimed the "conqueror of France," has been planning to take this old fortress. It will be interesting to learn whom he will make his scapegoat for the failure, as he considers himself a second Achilles. The awful slaughter to satisfy the ambition of this very conceited young man is horrible to contemplate, but it will not worry him. so long as he is not attacked for it or lose the throne. Verdun has twenty outlying forts, yet in the 71 days of the most horrible combat the world has ever known, the Huns only succeeded in taking two, and this was probably due to the fact that the French commanders considered their men more valuable than a little land and destroyed works. The British are liable to suffer now.

There was an immense crowd in town last Saturday, and an Express scribe took an hour off to watch the traffic on Talbot Street. The greatest surprise we experienced was that no one was injured . The provisions of gulation of traffic on Aylmer's streets, was again and again smashed into By-law 845, which provide for the resmithereens, and looked like a dead letter. The most glaring infringements were of a clause in Section 4, which says that "the driver of every vehicle requiring or desiring to stop at the curb, shall do so with the right hand side of the vehicle next to the curb, and as near the curb as possible;" and that part of Section 6, which states that the driver of a vehicle desiring to turn shall do so only at the intersection of streets There were many narrow escapes from collisions, and in one particular

President Wilson promptly informed the German Gov. ernment that this wholesale murder of American citizens would not be permitted, and that he would hold them to "strict accountability" for any similar attacks, but little or no attention was paid to him, and the same methods have been pursued by the submarines ever since. the situation by withstanding the atsia greatly in preventing Turkish effects of asphyxiating gas then used for the first time during this war, re-(or Flemish) were in alliance against France as a result of a schism in the Roman Catholic church. Pope Clement V. was a devoted adherent of the King of France, and took up his residence as near France as possible and never visited Rome as a Pope His successor, Gregory XI., died at Rome, and when the election of the next Pope was about to take place, the Italians insisted that if he were not a Roman, he at least must be an Italian. Of the 23 cardinals who formed the new college, 11 were French, the others being from Italy, Spain, Flanders, and Britain. When the Roman populace became so clamorous in their demands for an Italian Pope that when the Mass was held those attending could scarcely hear the service. It convinced the cardinals that a compromise must be effected, and a man was chosen who had not been a candidate of either of the rival factions. He was an Italian named Prignano, Archbishop of Bari, a man of austere life and great executive ability. He was crowned on Easter Sunday as Urban VI. The following day he rebuked some of his prelates and bishops for neglecting their duties, and two weeks afterward he reproached the cardinals for their immoral lives, and denounced the simony they had practised. The French cardinals left themselves prisoners about his court instead of enjoying the luxury of Avignon as previously, and proceeded to select a Pope more to their liking. They nominated and elected Clement VII., the Arch-Pope. Urban, however, was somewhat of a politician, and he created 28 new cardinals. France at once championed Clement VII., but both parties looked anxiously to Britain for support, as her contributions to the Holy One were very great. Britain at that time looked upon France as an enemy, and when Urban sent the Bishop of Norwich a Papal bull, or letter of authority, permitting him to take action against Clement, the people were in sympathy with him

Church was no sanctuary to his opponents. He raised an army and crossed the Channel to Flanders. The three most important cities in Flanders at this time were Ghent, Bruges, and Ypres. Ypres lay in the south, and was on the main road to Bruges. to the French without striking a blow. It was now held by a French garrison. If Ypres could be taken, communication with France would be cut off and Bruges would soon fall. It was one of the great cities of the world at a time when London had only about forty thousand inhabitants, and was the seat of an extensive woollen and linen industry. It as surrounded by beautiful suburbs, more magnificent than the extensive city itself. The alarm of an intended attack by the British soon reached the city, and fortifications were strengthened. The inhabitants rushed to the defence, while the British, deceived by the vastness of the suburbs which had fallen into their hands, fancied they had secured the city The suburbs were burned and a night of tumult followed. The British succeeded in cutting the city off from all supplies. The besiegers made repeated assaults, and there were many hand-to-hand fights, with heavy loss on both sides. The river that supplied the town was turned from its course, and attempts were made to fill up the dry ditch and scale the wall. Artillery threw stones into Ypres day and night. The wall was mined; the besiegers tried to set the town on fire. But all failed, and at the end of two months Ypres remained unconquered. As the siege went on, both sides became greatly distressed. The defenders of Ypres had always to combat with danger in their own camp. Soon both food and water began to fail, and it is a singular comment upon the chivalry of the days of chivalry, that women, whose husbands were absent, were turned out of the city when the pressure of famine was felt. What became of them we may only imagine. Human life and female honor found little reverence in a rough army of the four-
