—Mrs. Alfred Wigmore (late of London) assisted the choir at the opening services on Sunday last in connection with the Bloor Street Central Methodist Church. She sang Angela Ever Bright and Fair in the morning and "Nearer My God to Thee" in the evening in a very effective manner. (Toronto Globe.)

—Philip Wenneheimer charged a small boy named Alfred Partridge with tossing a brick at him the other day. The offense arose from the former kicking down some boards which the boy had nailed on the dividing fence. The affair amounted to very little and the Magistrate dismissed the case by allowing the defendant to go on suspended sentence.

—The meeting of the executive of the Young Liberal Club, which was held at the club last evening, was very largely attended, being presided over by the president, Mr. T. S. Hobbs. Standing committee, including an amusement committee, were appointed and preparations made for the commencement at once of the active work of the season.

—An interested crowd saw P. C. Howie arrest a drunk named McIntyre about 6 o'clock last evening at the corner of Central avenue and Richmond street. The man fought desperately and used his feet freely, but the big policeman was too much for him. He was fined \$2 or ten days for drunkenness by the Police Magistrate. The charge of assaulting the constable was withdrawn.

Death of Mrs. Hugh McPherson. The friends of Mrs. Hugh McPherson, of London West, will regret to learn of the death of his estimable young wife, Frances Adelaide Hogg, at the early age of 25 years and 8 months.

The deceased lady had been ailing for about four years from that dread disease consumption, and although everything was done that a kind husband and loving relatives could do, she gradually grew worse, until last night, when she passed peacefully away. Born in London West, she was well-known by a large circle of friends, who knew her to be a kind, cheerful, and one who always had a smile and encouraging word with which to greet her acquaintances. As a member of the London West Methodist Church she was always ready to give a helping hand to further any projects of that body. She leaves a husband and two little girls, together with several relatives, to mourn her untimely demise. The funeral will take place from 165 Wharncliffe road tomorrow afternoon at 4 o'clock.

St. John's Parish Club. This club has resumed its labors for the most season, and held its opening meeting last night, a large number of the members being present. MR. MERCHANT ACCEPTS. His Conditions Agreed to by the Board of Education—Delegates to the Provincial Convention Appointed.

As the London Board of Education is expected to send delegates to the Provincial Convention of Trustees at Toronto, a special meeting for the purpose of appointing such representatives was held last evening and at the same time a short discussion on the vacancies in the Council of Education took place. As the delegates were meeting in the Council Chamber the trustees were obliged to cluster in the assessor's office where the air was soon filled with the aroma of fine cigars. Those present were Trustees Jeffery (chairman), Stephenson, Brady, Dewar, Johnston, Tanton, Craig, Love, Jeffers, Woodward, Luscombe, Rowlands and Cook. The Principal, Little, Secretary Abbott and Inspector Boyle. The matter of appointing delegates came up, and the names of Messrs. Jeffers, Brady, Craig, Brady, Durbin, Rowlands, Childs, Stephenson, Luscombe were submitted, but several declined, and finally Messrs. Jeffers and Rowlands were elected.

Trustee Cook protested vigorously against sending delegates at all. Last year those sent had made no report whatever to the Board.

Several members—The proceedings are always reported in the papers.

Mr. Luscombe—And the delegates are never in condition to report, anyway.

The following telegram had been received by Mr. Stephenson, and was read by the chairman:

STAFFORD, Nov. 10. I will accept the position tendered me providing the following conditions are concurred in: 1. That a specialist in English be engaged. 2. That I be given full control of distribution of work among assistants and general internal management. 3. And that I be consulted in case of engagement or dismissal of assistants.

Mr. Stephenson said that Mr. Little had shown that two English masters were absolutely necessary.

Mr. Lovell said that Mr. Merchant was only asking for what was his right under the rules of the Board. He hoped it was not thought that the Board was anything but a reasonable and sensible body.
