THE WORLD OF WORK.

Status of the Strikes at Cardiff Sympathy of the Church with the Workingman.

A correspondent at Cardiff declares that the dockmen's strike has virtually colar lapsed, and that the Shipping Federation is supplying all the crews necessary.

The strike of street car drivers and conductors at Cardiff, Wales, has assumed a most serious aspect. Each car running is guarded by ten mounted policemen, and the streets are patrelled by an additional force of 300 police.

The Employers' Labor Association, of Liverpool, representing shipping of 750,000 tonnage, comprising all the leading owners and lines, has joined the Shipping Federation. This raises the aggregate tonnage of the Federation to 7,000,000, leaving only 2,000,000 tonnage in the United Kingdom not embraced in the Federation.

A dispatch from Rome says: In a letter dated Jan. 28, Cardinal Gibbons acknowledges the receipt of De Kurtin's valuable pamphlet discussing with so much ability social questions which should deeply concern every friend of humanity as well as the social conomists. The Cardinal rejoices that Christian philanthropists, in addition to many prelates under the leadership of the Pope, are laboring to mitigate the hardships of labor. "The tolling masses," he says, "should be practically convinced that they possess the sympathy of the Church. Mistakes are indeed made and sins sometimes committed by labor organizations. But these faults are usually exaggerated by timid souls and selfish capitalists.
