TORONTO, March 20—11 p.m.—The depression over the Southwest States yesterday has moved rapidly east, and is now passing over the Carolina coast. From the lakes to the Atlantic the pressure is rising and the weather is generally fine. In the Northwest the pressure is generally low, with cloudy, mild weather.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 20—30 degrees; Battleford, 24—40; Qu'Appelle, 26—44; Winnipeg, 24—42; Parry Sound, 2—34; Toronto, 20—32; Kingston, 16—30; Montreal, 16—26; Quebec, 14—26; Halifax, 14—28.

—Insurance Inspector A. Durand, of this

city, has been in Windsor adjusting the

claims for loss by the burning of St. An-

drew's Presbyterian Church. The total loss

was \$22,357; insurance \$13,200, leaving a

net loss of \$9,157.

—Taxes continue to come in slowly and it

is calculated that at the present rate of

payment \$20,000 will still be unpaid at the

end of the month. Of this all but \$5,000 is

counted good. No writs have been issued

so far, although it is in the power of the

collectors to do so.

—Dr. Macdonald, agent of the Methodist

Missionary Society in Japan, has written

acknowledging the receipt of the request of

the executive of the Mission Board that the

Methodist missionaries shall state specifi-

cally the nature of their grievances, but as

yet no word has been received from the mis-

sionaries themselves.

—The line light exhibition given at the

Hill Street Methodist Church last night was

a decided success, the church being filled to

its utmost capacity. Numerous pictures

were shown and the audience highly ap-

preciated them. The exhibition was in aid of

the church, which is very pretty both inside

and out. Judging from the number present,

a goodly sum was realized.

—Rev. Robert Johnston, of Lindsay,

Ont., preached morning and evening in

Creighton Street Church yesterday. Large

congregations greeted the popular preacher

of the west, who in his college days, was in-

timately connected with Crescent Street

one of the largest churches in the west, hav-
