Green Goods Case.

Sam Penny Jailed on a Charge of Selling Bad Dollars.
An Alleged Dealer in Counterfeit Money Caught at Owen Sound.
Owen Sound, Sept. 29.—Samuel Penny, a laborer, was arrested yesterday morning on the charge of swindling, by offering to sell counterfeit money. The mode of operation, it is said, is very complete, and, with his arrest, a number of letters and memoranda have been found, which are believed to be the work of the person with whom Penny did business.
Penny was apparently careful about those with whom he communicated, and made a careful study of the men. He then wrote them letters, offering \$10 bills at \$20 a hundred, \$5 bills at \$25 per \$100, and \$1 bills at \$30 per hundred. He gave no name, and asked all answers to be sent to G. B. T. Box 108, Owen Sound. The writer put no name on his letter, either, but was known by number. The letter was arrested, as he asked for the letters in Box 108.

The Sultan Warned by France.

London, Sept. 29.—Constantinople advices say M. Cambon, the French ambassador, held a long interview with the Sultan yesterday, in which he declared that the reforms granted in the Armenian provinces must be extended over the entire Turkish Empire. The dispatch says this is the first diplomatic move of France, and is regarded as a final warning.
THE TURKISH VERSION.
The Turkish legation at Washington has received from the Sublime Porte the following telegram under yesterday's date: "The Armenian revolutionists of Pinkan, a village situated in the Province of Sivas, after paying fire to their own houses, ran away. But they returned again and put fire to the houses that had not been burned the first time. The local authorities took every precaution to extinguish the fire. The object of the revolutionists is evidently to make the people believe that there is no security in their country, but their efforts to again provoke trouble have been frustrated, thanks to the efficient measures adopted by the Imperial Government."

Cecil Rhodes.

London, Sept. 29.—A petition for the reinstating of Cecil Rhodes as Premier of Cape Colony has been numerously signed in Johannesburg and its vicinity. Many German farmers signed it. When he went to the Matopopo Hills to meet the Matabele chiefs and talk peace he was accompanied by only three men, and they were unarmed. There were present at the parley more than 100 young native warriors, all armed with Martini rifles and assegais. One who took part in the conference says that every white man concerned looked forward to it as involving serious risk. At a council before starting it was agreed that he should be shot by his own party rather than be allowed to fall into the hands of the enemy, should treachery be attempted. Those who had questioned Mr. Rhodes' personal courage are now silent on that point.

A Turkish Statement.

London, Sept. 29.—A Constantinople dispatch says: The Porte has issued a statement rejoicing at the apparent reaction in some of the London newspapers against the excessive anti-Sultan agitation in Great Britain, which it declares is unwelcome for the terror

London, Sept. 29.—It is reported here that the dock laborers of Hamburg have gone out on a strike.

RUSSIA AND JAPAN.

London, Sept. 29.—The newspapers of Tokyo deny the assertion published in London that Russia and Japan have agreed upon a joint protectorate in Korea.

LAND VALUES IN JOHANNESBURG.

London, Sept. 29.—A piece of land, 50 by 40 feet, on Commissioner street, Johannesburg, has changed hands for no less a sum than \$100,000—\$2,000 a foot front.

ENGLAND AND ITALY.

London, Sept. 29.—The Daily News' correspondent at Rome is assured that negotiations are pending between England and Italy with a view to the latter Government holding in readiness a large body of troops to sail at a moment's notice for the Levant.

COL. RHODES TO RETIRE.

London, Sept. 29.—Col. Francis W. Rhodes, brother of Cecil Rhodes, who was one of the members of the Johannesburg reform committee sentenced to death for treason and sedition against the Transvaal, but was subsequently pardoned, will retire from the British army.

TROUBLE IN THIBET.

London, Sept. 29.—A special from Shanghai says that everywhere throughout Thibet the revolt against the Chinese Government is spreading. In consequence of this rebellion, 3,000 Chinese troops have been sent to reinforce the garrison in Thibet.

LONDON'S NEW MAYOR.

London, Sept. 29.—Ald. George Frazer Phillips, sheriff of the county of London, and a brother-in-law of Sir Edward Lawson, the principal proprietor of the Daily Telegraph, was elected Lord Mayor of London today with the usual ceremonies, to succeed Sir Walter Wilkin.

THE QUEEN'S GUESTS.

Ballater, Scotland, Sept. 29.—The weather was fine yesterday, and the Czar took advantage of the opportunity to go out on a grouse shooting trip. The Czar and Zarina will start on Oct. 3 for the south, en route for Paris, where they are expected to arrive on the morning of Oct. 6.

CANADIANS COMPLIMENTED.

London, Sept. 29.—The report of the recent Shoeburyness meeting has just been issued, and in it Col. Stewart, the commandant, pays a flattering tribute to the cleverness with which the Canadian team in the position and position artillery competition was handled.

THE SULTAN WARNED BY FRANCE.

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in Constantinople, the foreign residents naturally fearing the wrath of the Mussulmans at the insults to the Sultan uttered by the speakers at the public meetings and by the journals of England. The statement continues: Despite the organized agitation, vituperation and clamorous provocation emanating from London, the Porte has succeeded, by dint of energy and watchfulness, in proving to Europe that the alarm of its English insulter is unfounded. The Porte does not associate the British nation, for which it has the highest regard, with the agitation of a few hot-brained politicians who are led astray by their passions. The moderation of the European nations will far more than the vociferation of England help the Porte to protect foreigners and Turkish subjects in the capital against the plots of Armenian revolutionists.

A dispatch from Constantinople says that the Sultan has expelled a second wife and a number of palace courtiers, on suspicion that they were plotting with the heir to the throne and his brother, the ex-Sultan Murad, to depose him.

SOUDAN CAMPAIGN.

London, Sept. 29.—A dispatch from Dongola says: The gunboat Abuklea has returned from the pursuit of the Dervishes. The officers on the gunboat report that the Dervishes are in full retreat, that a veritable panic prevails, and that the sheiks are moving in the direction of Omdurman. Many of the local sheiks have been brought into the camp. About 200 Dervishes are reported killed. The Sirdar, Sir Herbert Kitchener, is sending the first Staffordshire Regiment back to Koshah, en route to Cairo, which seems to indicate that there will be no further advance up the Nile for the present, at least.

The Times, speaking of the order of Sir Herbert Kitchener for the return of the First Staffordshire Regiment from Dongola to Koshah on the way to Cairo, says that the inference to be drawn from the order is that the Dervishes' power has collapsed, and that it is not intended that there should be a further forward movement on a large scale at present. Other newspapers suggest that it is merely an economical move on account of a difficulty of victualling the expedition on the dates being obtainable at Dongola.

HEMMED IN!

Serious Fighting in Matabeleland—British Forces in a Tight Place.
Salisbury, Matabeleland, Sept. 29.—There has been serious fighting on the Mazoe River during the last three days. During one engagement a British force was hemmed in for ten hours by a strong force of insurgents.

EARTHQUAKES IN ICELAND

No Call for Subscriptions—The Shocks Were Not Serious.

London, Sept. 29.—When the news reached here, a few days ago, of the disastrous earthquakes in Iceland, a number of soft-hearted folk wrote to the newspapers suggesting the establishment of a relief fund for the sufferers. In case similar appeals have been made in America, it may be well to say that although 66 shocks were experienced in about a week, little damage was done, and there is certainly no occasion for outsiders to go into hysterics over the matter. The Icelanders are used to earthquakes and rather like them, as they break the monotony of those high northern latitudes, and when confined within reasonable limits, attract rather than repel tourists. Altogether 206 farms have been destroyed, which indicates an earthquake of fairly respectable dimensions. But the Icelanders are not worrying in the slightest.
Mr. John M. Mitchell, a London lawyer, has just returned here, after a pleasant holiday in Iceland. He says the Governor told him that no public subscriptions of any kind were required, as the Government intended to find any money necessary, and was perfectly prepared to cope with the disaster. The dispatch says that they ought to deal with their own affairs, and nothing short of a national disaster would induce them to seek outside aid.

The Woodstock Tragedy.

Results of the Post Mortem Examination.

The Bullet That Killed Levi Gardner Found—Statements of the Neighbors.

Woodstock, Sept. 29.—As a result of the post-mortem examination on the body of Levi Gardner, the colored man supposed to have been murdered at his home on Saturday, a bullet was found in his head, on a lounge in the room a discharged cartridge was found.
James Dunlop, an employee of the Thomas Organ Company, heard screams coming from the Gardner cottage, and he at once left the office and rushed over to see what was the matter. On arriving at the house he found Gardner lying on the floor dead, his head surrounded by a pool of blood and wounds in the head and face, as previously described.

Alex. Stewart is an old man who lives in the back kitchen of the Gardner house. A wooden partition separates the room where the tragedy occurred from that of his own. His statement was as follows:
"I was just arising from my morning devotions when I heard a noise in the front of the house where the Gardner live. It was a pistol shot, and immediately afterwards I heard some further noises, and the words:
"Oh, Jim! oh, Jim!" uttered in hysterical tones. That was all I heard. Gardner sometimes went by the name of Jim.
McCombus is tall and rather good-looking. His wife is at present living in Hamilton, where she is following the avocation of a fortune teller. McCombus is a good long distance from here, and often on Saturday nights, after his day's work at the Stewart factory, he runs down to Ham-
