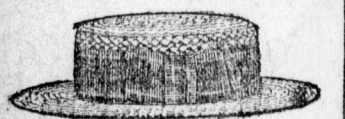

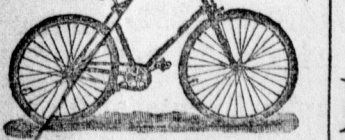

### TWO DAYS IN HISTORY.

June 11.

1234—Roger Bacon, commonly called Friar Bacon, scholar, alchemist and liberal writer, died at Oxford, born 1214.

—The Port Stanley public school had a flag-raising demonstration on Friday. An eighteen-foot Dominion ensign was hoisted in the lake breezes. Speeches were delivered by Judge Hughes, Rev. J. A. MacDonald, Inspector Atkin, T. W. Crothers and Capt. McBride, of St. Thomas, and Rev. Black, of London. The Rev. J. A.
