WHERE SNOW FLIES

The Fifteen Feet of It in the Yukon May Cause Disastrous Flood—Snow and Frost Down South.

IN THE YUKON.

Vancouver, B. C., April 22.—Old-timers in the Yukon are anticipating a flood because of the unprecedented snowfall along the Yukon. A heavy snowfall, aggregating four feet, has been recorded a week ago.

It is stated that there is now fifteen feet of snow on the summit, and the White Horse and Yukon Railway Company are preparing for possible trouble when the snow melts.

SNOW IN TENNESSEE.

Chattanooga, Tenn., April 22.—Special dispatches from Huntsville, Tenn., on the top of the Cumberland Mountains, say there is from four to six inches of snow on the ground there, and it is still falling.

Knoxville, Tenn., April 22.—This is the coldest point south of St. Paul, Minn., according to the weather bureau reports, the temperature being 39 at 7 a.m. Indications are for warmer weather, although snow is falling in upper east Tennessee.

FROST IN FLORIDA AND GEORGIA.

Atlanta, Ga., April 22.—Low temperature in some sections, causing injury to cotton and other growing crops, prevailed over the Southern States today. Weather bureau reports show slight frost in the vicinity of Jacksonville, Fla., Meridian, Miss., and Charleston, S. C. Snow is reported at Gainesville in Northern Florida, the mountain tops being capped with white. An unusual sight at this time of the year. Albany, in South Georgia, reports the estimated damage to cotton at 50 per cent and that wheat and corn and canteloupes have been injured 25 per cent.

Russia has loaned 400,000 tails to a Tartar general, on security of the land and poll taxes, to form a force of military police in Feng Tien, Manchuria.

Count Tolstoy's next novel, it is said, will describe how a beautiful young Russian society woman was transformed from a drone into a busy bee in the hive of human industry.

A dispatch from Victoria, B. C., says that a revolt of the British Columbia Government members, led by Mr. Helmecken, has placed the fate of the Dunsmeuir Administration in the balance.

President J. J. Hill, of the Great Northern, dashed into St. Paul Sunday on his three-car special, having made the 1,323 miles from Seattle in 45 hours and 50 minutes, at times traveling 44.5 miles an hour.

Chinese brothels in San Francisco were raided by United States deputy marshals Sunday and 24 female slaves were rescued. Sixteen had to be released, and at once returned to their awful life.

Pastor Mullen, of the Catholic Church, Highland, N. Y., has paid back his offer of \$10,000 for the return of kidnapped Willie McCarthy, because a horde of fakirs and clairvoyants have worried him to death.

Thomas Maughan, bartender in the Albion Hotel, Stratford, dropped dead while serving a customer on Saturday afternoon. The cause of death was pronounced by the coroner as apoplexy. Maughan was about 25 years old.

According to a New York Herald dispatch from Buenos Ayres, Dr. Villar, an army surgeon, announces that he has discovered a serum to prevent tuberculosis. He says 30 experiments have been made with good results.

PHIL GUNN IS DEAD.

St. Louis, April 23.—Philip Gunn, who was stabbed in the heart Saturday night and was made the subject of an heroic operation at the city hospital, died yesterday. Three stitches were put in Gunn's heart. Salt water replaced the lost blood and heart stimulants kept the man alive for a time.

BURSTING PIPE KILLED HIM.

Schenectady, N. Y., April 22.—A 12-inch pipe, in the basement of the General Electric Company, burst this morning, fatally injuring Fred Jassef and badly wounding several others.

DEADLY FIGHT OVER A KEG OF BEER.

Syracuse, N. Y., April 22.—Vincenzo Paternano, an Italian, 32 years old, died at the hospital this morning from a bullet wound inflicted by S. Castrogiovanni, also an Italian, yesterday afternoon, during a fight over a keg of beer.

TOUCHED A LIVE WIRE.

Syracuse, N. Y., April 22.—George Boddy, a 9-year-old colored boy, was killed by a live wire on the Erie Canal tow path near Crouse avenue. It had become charged from an electric light pole. Investigation showed that the boy had been playing with the wire and the current passed through his body until the wire was torn away by him from the morgue a half hour afterwards.

LIVE MAN INSIDE A HEARSE.

Ludington, Mich., April 22.—Town folks were recently shocked at the spectacle of a passing hearse through the glass sides of which could be seen the form of a man stretched out inside. The hearse was being driven by a man who was supposed to be the local undertaker, who, becoming chilled by the raw winds while returning from a country where he appeared to be in a hurry, had been found dead in the hearse.

IRON TANK FELL SIX STORIES.

Chicago, Ill., April 23.—A high wind, which reached Chicago yesterday, loosened a huge iron water tank from its fastenings on the roof of the Great Western building, and it crashed through the six floors to the ground, injuring five persons and resulting in a damage to the building estimated at \$50,000.

The man and woman ran away, but McEvoy gave a description of them to the police, and a man and woman were arrested in Kingston on suspicion of the murder.

How Theatrical Audiences Differ—Interview With Miss Alberta Gallatin, Who Appears at the London Opera House Tonight.

In an interview yesterday with Alberta Gallatin who appeared at the London Opera House last night in "Neil Gwynne," an advertiser reporter asked if she found any material difference in audiences in the various sections of the country over which she traveled. "Oh, yes," replied Miss Gallatin. "I find a difference in cities only fifty miles apart. For instance, I was recently playing in two western cities quite near each other. The first one gave every evidence of its appreciation by numerous curtain calls and considerable applause during the acts. The following night I appeared before a large and most fashionably dressed audience in the second city. All the so-called 'points' went for nothing. The curtain went down at the end of each act with what seemed to me a dead and sickly thud, and with perhaps two or three friendly hands from the gallery. On seeing my manager after the second act, I exclaimed: 'Please tell me what is the matter. Don't they like me?' He was unable to say, and he admitted that he appeared to be disappointed that they did not. I felt much grieved and spent a sleepless night wondering as to the cause of my failure."

The next morning I was introduced to a prominent railroad official, who informed me that he, as well as his wife and sister, had enjoyed my work and play extremely. He went on to say that I had made a most favorable impression on his audience, and finished his eulogy with: 'Why, no one left the theater during the play; even the manager's family in the left-hand box sat throughout the entire performance.' I could not refrain from laughing at this. He then added: 'Let me assure you that is a great compliment. The people of this city never applaud, but when they remain throughout an entire play it is very evident that they like it and the star.' As my notices were very fine in this same city I began to feel that I had not made a failure after all, and accepted the fact that my audience remained with me for three hours as a mark of approval."

Jackson, Mich., April 22.—Some 40 freight handlers at the Michigan Central freight house went on a strike Saturday night. Truckers have been paid 11½ cents an hour and loaders 12½ cents. About a week ago a demand was made for an increase of 12½ cents and 15 cents an hour, and no answer being received the men struck. The local agent gave them assurances that the increase would be granted and the trouble was over in an hour or so. The two electric railway cars have absorbed all the surplus labor in the country hereabouts and still need more men, and prospects for general increase in the wages of common labor are favorable.
