THIRTY-FIVE YEARS AGO TODAY

(From The London Advertiser of April 18, 1871)

We observe by Ottawa papers that in a recent speech at the capital, Ven. Archdeacon McLean enunciated the idea that it was desirable to have as a permanent ruler of Canada one of the royal princes of Britain, on very much the same terms as the princes of the German States rule under the supreme authority of the Emperor. He does not advocate hasty action, but thinks our efforts in peopling the country should have some political object in view, and that the above is the best calculated for our own happiness as well as for securing our connection for ever with our British progenitors. Here's a scheme for you! What do you think of it?

The New York Evening Mail trusts that the American members of the joint high commission will not surrender the island of San Juan in Puerto Rico, or any other part thereof, to the British Government. Our contemporary urges this view not so much from a conviction that the claim is just, as from the importance of securing thereby for the Northern Pacific Railway "a good route on American soil," and a terminus controlled wholly by themselves.

When so usually fair and respectable a journal as the Evening Mail urges the American members of the joint high commission to set aside argument and justice, if need be, to accomplish a specified end, it is plain proof that a dry rot of demagoguery has set in among the journalists and public men of the other side.

The anniversary of American Oddfellowship will be celebrated in this city by a concert, service and ball in the city hall, on the evening of Wednesday, 26th inst. The concert will be under the management of Mrs. Wilson, a number of lady and gentleman amateurs assisting.

Those dangerous nuisances known as "catapults" are reappearing among the schoolboys here, and we would not be surprised to hear of some serious accident occurring from their use. The police should be instructed to arrest everyone found carrying them, and to keep a sharp lookout for boys who make a practice of firing stones at whistles and people passing on the streets, from the flat roofs of some of the buildings on our principal streets. Such things have been done within the past few days.

COMPANY'S PLACE TO REPAIR ROAD

If L. E. and D. R. R. Fails to Do So, Lease of Lake Line May Be Canceled.

The London and Port Stanley Railway board held a fifteen-minute session last night, and took summary action in regard to the necessary repairs to the roadbed and bridges of the company's line to the Port.

City Solicitor Meredith was instructed to notify the Lake Erie and Detroit River Railway Company, the lessees, to put the road in proper shape forthwith. If the company fails to carry out this order, then the city may find it advisable to cancel the company's lease of the road, which has still about nine years to run.

The motion to this effect was made by Ald. Garratt, and it was adopted unanimously.

The city solicitor gave his opinion to the effect that the lessees must make the repairs under the second clause of the agreement.

Owing to the run-down condition of the road, the estimates estimate that the repairs will require a very large expenditure each year as long as the Lake Erie's lease continues.

Mr. Meredith pointed out that in case of accident to passengers or freight, the railway people are liable, but the city feels that now is the time to have the road put in shape before the excursion traffic begins.

"We don't care who is liable for damages," Ald. Gillean said. "We wish to preserve the lives of the people of London."

The company will be given one week in which to make up its mind.

REMITTING TAXES CAUSES A FLURRY

Council Agitates Itself Over a Paltry Six Dollar Matter.

Quite a lively discussion was caused at the meeting of the city council last night through the recommendation of No. 1 of Grey street, for the remission of the third installment of her 1905 taxes on a \$500 property be filed. The installment amounted to \$6.

Ald. Cooper moved in amendment, seconded by Ald. Stevenson, that the application be granted. Ald. Cooper began to read No. 1 for refusing the request, and Ald. Gillean retorted that if Ald. Cooper took the trouble to attend to his duties, he might know a little more of the recommendations of that body.

The inspector's report was then read, and it stated that the woman in question is a widow, aged 45, has a house and lot worth \$500, free and clear, and has only one little girl of 13 years to support. She is able to work.

Ald. Stevenson disputed the report. He stated that the woman is ill. Her husband died of tuberculosis, and he (Dr. Stevenson), had cared for him free of charge for eighteen months. The city had heartlessly turned the man out of the hospital and had allowed him to return to his home, the wife then becoming infected with the disease.

"If ever there was a case where charity may be exercised, it is this," Ald. Gillean said. "The woman is not able to work, and the rental of \$10 a month she receives for the house she owns will not commence to keep herself and her child."

Ald. Gillean said that after hearing Ald. Stevenson's explanation he was ready to vote for the remission.

Ald. Matthews took a similar stand. "If a rich man came before you, you would cut a couple of thousand dollars off his taxes," he said.

"I'll pay one-half the taxes out of my own pocket, if some other alderman will pay the other half," said Ald. Forristal. "There are hundreds of women as much as this woman does at the city's hands. I for one will not ask the city to make an exception of this case."

"I'll pay the other half," said Ald. Gillean.

"Where's Ald. Cooper now with his own money?" asked Ald. Forristal. Ald. Cooper said nothing to this, but he still favored the remission of the installment.

Finally the vote was taken, and the motion to remit the taxes was carried by 7 to 3.

CANNIBALS OR NO?

Mr. Sonley Tells Historical Society That Some Aborigines Were.

At the regular meeting of the London Historical Society, held last evening, Dr. Woolverton read an extremely interesting and instructive paper on the Indian fort situated on the property of the late Mr. R. Shaw-Wood, on the fourth concession of London Township.

From observation and investigation extending over many years, Dr. Woolverton has come to the conclusion that an Indian fort was located at that place. It belonged to the Neutrals.

Mr. Sonley, who has been located on the farm for some time, has made a discovery outlining the fort. He has unearthed a large number of most interesting relics in his investigation, and these were shown last night, and are a great addition to the collections in this part of the country. Mr. Sonley found very great number of bones of Indians, and also unearthed several skeletons. He found them mixed with the bones of animals, and in some cases the bones are split and chopped.

FILED APPLICATION

Council Would Not Grant Exemption and Site to Industry.

Taking the position that the city can do nothing for an industry if there are other similar industries in the city, the council last night by a vote of 8 to 2—two members not voting—filed the application of the London Cement Brick Machine Company, which asked for a free site, exemption from taxation, etc.

A motion to refer the matter to the manufacturers' committee met with defeat.

The council refused to refund the rental of \$10 charged St. Andrew's Society for the use of the city hall for a banquet some time ago, though No. 1 committee recommended that the rental be returned to the society.

Some of the aldermen didn't consider the society a charitable institution, while Ald. Forristal and others stoutly maintained that St. Andrew's, St. George's and the Irish Benevolent Societies are nothing at all but not charitable.

The vote on the question resulted in the council voting nay, thus refusing the refund.
