The London and Port Stanley Railway board held a fifteen-minute session last night, and took summary action in regard to the necessary repairs to the roadbed and bridges of the company's line to the Port. City Solicitor Meredith was in-

structed to notify the Lake Erie and Detroit River Railway Company, the lessees, to put the road in proper shape forthwith. If the company fails to carry out this order, then the city may find it advisable to cancel the company's lease of the road, which has still about nine years to run. The motion to this effect was made by Ald. Garratt, and it was adopted

unanimously. The city solicitor gave his opinion to the effect that the lessees must make the repairs under the second clause of the agreement. Owing to the run-down condition of

the road, the city engineer estimates that the repairs will require a very large expenditure each year as long as the Lake Erie's lease continues. Mr. Meredith pointed out that in case of accidents to passengers or freight, the railway people are liable, but the city feels that now is the time to have the road put in shape before the excursion traffic begins.
