As head of the literature department of the University of Chicago, he traverses the literature of all nations, and on the occasion of his forthcoming visit has one recital derived from the French, another from the Marathi and a third from the ancient Hebrew. Fortunately these are all obtainable in English, and those who hear these lectures are likely to want to read for themselves what he has illumined in his recitals. The Fairy Queen is an unknown book to most people, although it is counted a masterpiece, and ranks as a landmark in the history of English literature. Dr. Moulton reads often the things he likes much, and he has read this poem twenty-three times, although he says he has never met any one else who has read it more than three times. The trustees of the Protestant Orphans' Home held their regular monthly meeting on Monday when a large number of the members of the board were present.

The medical report presented by Dr. J. S. Niven at the recent annual meeting was referred to, he having made mention of a necessary inspection of the drainage in connection with the home, which has caused some trouble lately. It was moved to ask Dr. Niven to kindly have this attended to.
The trustees are grateful to all generous contributors to the home during the past month.

Great Treat in Dundas Center Church
Music lovers were treated to a most delightful recital last night, when Mendelssohn's beautiful "Hymn of Praise" was rendered at Dundas Street Center Methodist Church by a choir of 60 voices, including Mr. Theo Van York, the celebrated tenor from New York; Miss Annie Reid, soprano soloist, and Miss Beatrice Hunt, mezzo soloist, of the same church.
The musical programme was under the direction of Mr. J. Parnell-Morris, and was carried through in a manner that won for all the unstinted praise of the audience, which was one of the largest ever present at a recital in London.

The introductory piece was Gounod's setting of Psalm cxxxvii, in which the beautiful number, "By Babylon's Wave," expressing dramatically the desolation of the Hebrew captives in Babylon, was most artistically rendered. The final movement, in which the full chorus is heard, was very well rendered, and was in striking contrast to the plaintive singing at the commencement of the number.
The rich tenor of Mr. Theo Van York was heard to considerable advantage in two numbers in this part.

WILL METER ALL SCHOOLS IN CITY
Water Commissioners So Decide at a Meeting Held Yesterday.

At the regular meeting of the water commission yesterday afternoon, it was decided to place meters on all public and separate schools in the city, and also on warehouses where water power was used for elevators and hoists.

The question was brought to the attention of the commission by the council asking the water commission for a statement of the amount of water used by the Mann Brass Works.
Chairman Darch was of the opinion that meters should be placed on all large consumers. The waste of water in schools was considerable. The closets in nearly all instances are automatic, and if they are not turned off after hours a great deal of water is wasted.

Mr. John Bowman wrote protesting against the overcharge on the hoist in the warehouse occupied by C. H. Reason & Co. The register is out of order, and has been for some time. Both Engineer Moore and Inspector Plowton have known for some time that it was out of order, but it has been fixed. It was decided to wait for another month in order to find out how much water is used, and thus fix the amount of an overcharge.

Buy More Land.
Engineer Moore advised the commission to buy a portion of the Summers' property at Byron in order to prevent the Springbank supply from this quarter being contaminated. He would get the water from this spring nearer its source, as, where the collection spring was at present located, it was almost impossible to prevent it being contaminated by the overflow. The property contains about two-thirds of an acre.
