KING AND QUEEN TO VISIT PARIS

Preparations for Trip of Prince and Princess of Wales to Africa Well Advanced.

Paris, Nov. 30. — It has been decided that King Edward shall pay an other state visit to Paris next year. So the King and Queen would visit Spain and Portugal next year, President Fallières at once extended an invitation to them to halt in Paris on their return. The King agreed, and it is highly probable they will remain in the French capital two or three days.

Should this be the case, the central feature of the visit will be a gala performance at the opera house, and a review of the garrison on the Champ de Mars. It is some time since the King last viewed the French army on parade, and every effort will be made to show him the troops at their very best.

The King and Queen leave for Lisbon in the royal yacht Victoria and Albert about the second week in March, and will be absent about three weeks. Subsequently the Queen, accompanied by Princess Victoria, and possibly by the Princess Royal and Duke of Fife, and their daughters, will take another cruise in the Mediterranean, and the Queen will not return to England until toward the end of May.

The arrangements for the visit of the Prince and Princess of Wales to South Africa are now well advanced. It is decided that they shall be accompanied by Princess Mary of Wales, and that the ship is to be chartered for the accommodation of the royal party. Whatever ship is chosen practically will be remodelled to provide suitable accommodation for their royal highnesses and their suites. Distinguished officers of both the army and the navy are to accompany the prince and princess. There is just a possibility the veteran Lord Roberts will be the representative of the army on this tour.

The projected visit to Russia of a body of prominent men associated with the commercial interests of the United Kingdom and representative of British industrial centres will be paid early next month. The invitation came in the first instance from the Russo-British Chamber of Commerce, but since then many influential members of the Duma have associated with the invitation, and the Russian officials have been able to convey the assurance that the tour has the sympathy of the Emperor of Russia. The trip is one of the many proofs of the better relations now existing between England and Russia.

TESTIMONIAL CONCERT

Will Be Held in the Bennett Theatre on Sunday Night.

A sacred concert will be held in Bennett's Theatre on Sunday night next, when a fund will be raised for the widow and family of the late Arthur W. Geiger. In view of the fact that Rev. Mr. Mallott, pastor of Colborne Street Methodist Church, will be compelled to preach in Byron on that evening, the opening prayer will be offered by Rev. Mr. Whiting, pastor of the Dundas Street Methodist Church, but Rev. Mr. Mallott will attend the concert as soon as he can get back from Byron. Those in charge of the concert are somewhat annoyed because several of the artists who had been engaged have excused themselves on the ground that their church standing might be injured if they sang in a theatre, even at a sacred concert, on Sunday night. A member of the committee informed a reporter that the places of the artists referred to would be filled, and that with such men as Rev. Mr. Mallott and Rev. Mr. Whiting taking an interest in the project, they have nothing to fear. It is prophesied that the theatre will be filled to the doors by the anxious to do good by adding to the testimonial fund which is to be presented to Mrs. Geiger, whose husband was organist of the Colborne Street Methodist Church.

A FORMER LONDONER SOUNDS OCEAN DEPTHS

Sir John Murray Is Engaged by Norway For Scientific Expedition.

London, Nov. 30. — Sir John Murray, of the Challenger, is preparing to sound the depths of the ocean once more. The King of Norway has placed at his disposal a Government ship, the Michael Sars, and in April, with a properly equipped scientific staff on board, she will begin to scour the bottom of the North Atlantic. The voyage will start at the Canaries and proceed northward as far as the Faroe Islands, if time permits. Sir John was born in London, but many years ago and is one of the world's best-known scientists.

One object in view is to test appliances devised in recent years in the endeavor to procure new information. Trawls will be set for a depth of three miles and a half, and fine silk nets will be used to secure minute animal and vegetable specimens. A new current measuring instrument, which has proved successful at 200 fathoms, will be tried at greater depths, and attempts will be made to force tubes into the deposits at the ocean bottom, but so far this has not been penetrated deeper than eighteen inches.

Countless biological and physiological problems have been solved, and though deep sea investigations, American and European, of the Atlantic have not been uncommon of late, the public have not heard of Monaco and of Alexander Agassiz will occur at once—there is no doubt that Sir John Murray and his associates will be able, with ordinary success, to add much to our knowledge of our own home ocean.

GLADIOLI FOR SOUTH AFRICA

H. H. Groff, of Simcoe, Will Send Some to Johannesburg.

Mr. H. H. Groff, of Simcoe, Ont., whose fame as a hybridist and horticulturist is world-wide, and who is well known locally, has been asked to supply some 3,000 of his new hybrid Gladioli to the public parks and gardens of Johannesburg, Africa.

This is one of the most interesting horticultural problems of the modern progress and scientific achievement, for the reason that the most useful wild plant of the world, the Gladiolus, is a native of South Africa, and Mr. Groff's hybrids are based, come from Africa.

The claim of that romance is most materially enhanced by the fact that in spite of the prior work of European planters, Mr. Groff's hybrids are able to secure the highest credit of making an attractive and relatively valuable weed of the Dark Continent, and after a period of scientific hybridization, return the plant to its original habitat in its acquired perfection of high quality, great diversity and the most beautiful in its range of color.

LONDON MAN'S SUCCESS

G. C. Martin Has Been Appointed General Freight Agent of T. H. and B. Railway.

Hamilton Times: From operator to assistant general freight and passenger agent with detailed experience in every line of railroad work, gathered in all parts of the continent, G. C. Martin, who is officially announced, will on Dec. 1 succeed to the position of general freight and passenger agent of the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo Railway, after a faithful and successful career as chief clerk of the traffic department of that railway. Mr. Martin is known in all the better circles of Canada and the United States as an expert train dispatcher and station auditor, and in his extensive career as a railroad man has always given complete satisfaction to those by whom he was employed. He was appointed to his present position in 1881 in Calgary, where he was engaged as an operator on the C. P. R. construction at the age of 15 years. He left that position in December of the same year, and was with the Manitoba and North-western Railway ten months, when he was appointed to his position as chief clerk at Colville Junction. He was there until June, 1888, when he was transferred to Colton East, from that place he was appointed in October, 1887, to the position of agent at Cardwell Junction, where he was stationed until 1900, when he became connected with the Grand Trunk City ticket office at London as solicitor. In April, 1891, he entered the employ of the C. P. R. as operator and train dispatcher at Woodstock, and after being there a short time was appointed relieving agent. In 1894 he again became connected with the Grand Trunk, entering their employ at Toronto in the Union ticket office, and in 1897 he was appointed to the position of chief clerk in the traffic department of the T. H. and B. Railway, which he will hold until Dec. 1, 1909, when he will enter upon his new duties.

DOUGLAS H. GRAND ON WAY TO CHICAGO

Well-Known Former Londoner Visits Friends in City on Way Over From London, England.

Mr. Douglas H. Grand, a former Londoner, and one of the best-known horsemen on the continent, was in the city for a couple of days last week on his way to Chicago, where he will attend the annual horse show. He has been in England of late years, and is now living retired near London, where he has made a fortune. He was well-known in London fifteen years ago, being a prominent member of the London Hunt Club. It is expected that he will remain in this city for a few days on his return from Chicago.

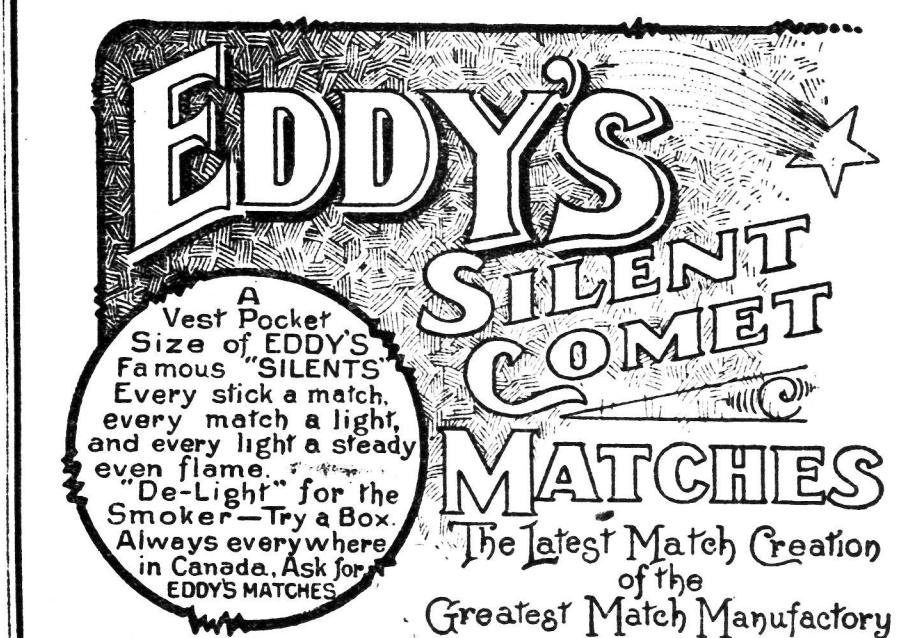
