SCENES OF DISORDER

(Continued from Page One.)

Balfour Desperate.
London, Jan. 7.—Premier Asquith, David Lloyd-George, John Burns and other members of the Government, occupied last night in denouncing Arthur J. Balfour's alarmist references to Germany, and refuting his accusations of the unpreparedness of the navy.

Chancellor Lloyd-George, who received an ovation at Peshawar, a London district, described Mr. Balfour's speech as the last resort of a thoroughly desperate man, who saw that his cause was lost. Mr. Balfour had indulged in plucking the German eagle's tail feathers, and tail-twisting had become a discreditable practice, he said, even in America. He was sorry to see the leader of a great party, and an experienced statesman, reduced to the extremity of following in the footsteps of the most discredited type of politicians in the United States. Such talk was dangerous to the world's peace and a disgrace to British politics.

The German Scenario.
Great Britain, the chancellor went on, in her time, had warred with almost every country, but never with Germany. On the contrary, she had generally had Germany on her side. During the past decade, Great Britain had built nearly double the number of battleships constructed by Germany, but to this she was reversing the ratio. He would not be afraid, because Great Britain had the men behind the guns.

"But," he added, "we will continue to build warships faster than Germany."

Mr. Balfour, speaking again at Ipswich, followed Lord Lansdowne with regard to the reform of the House of Lords. "By all means," he said, "let us reform the House of Lords in order to strengthen it."

Serious disturbances again marked many of the meetings. The Earl of Donoughmore and Lord Chylchmore, attempted to address a Conservative meeting at Coventry, found that they had been captured beforehand by the Radicals, who howled all the speakers down. The meeting broke up in disorder.

A similar fate overtook Lord Rothschild at Wolverton, where a crowd of rough hoodlums rushed the door. Sir William Hall, member of the House of Commons for Birmingham, while speaking before the electors of that constituency, was rudely heckled by a man in the crowd. He threatened to punch the man's head.

"Come on!" shouted the man. Sir William forthwith descended and the crowd formed a ring. A stand-up fight ensued until the police separated the combatants.

Orange Lodge Manifesto.
London, Jan. 6.—The Belfast Grand Orange Lodge yesterday issued a manifesto declaring that any candidate who opposes a properly selected Unionist candidate and calls himself Unionist acts the part of a traitor at the siege of Derry, and every man who votes for such a candidate is a traitor to his home.

Swift McNeill, M. P., said it was too late to rouse religious bigotry. Lord Randolph Churchill was up to his neck in the Parnell and Conservative combination in 1885, but finding the Conservatives could not succeed in giving home rule, he told Justin McCarthy: "I have done all I can for you; now I must do all I can against you." He later declared: "Cluster will fight and Cluster will be right." But no fight was left. Rev. Fireaway Flanagan threatened to kick the crown into the Boyne if the church was disestablished, but the crown was still safe on King Edward.

THE U. S. TO FIGHT CANADA FOR PULP

Montreal Star Says If War Comes It Will Be Over Timber Resources.

Montreal, Jan. 7.—Discussing the possibility of a war between Canada and the States, the Montreal Star says:

"If the United States and Canada ever come to blows, which heaven forbid, it will not really be because of a frontier dispute, a question of diplomatic etiquette, the seizure of a poaching schooner or a fool flag incident."

"It will be because the press of the United States is in want of cheap pulpwood, because the Canadian forests are a necessity to a nation which has squandered its own timber resources or because, as is the case in Germany today, economic conditions have rendered it vitally necessary for the great American nation to have greater markets and more hope for expansion."

SARNIA JOURNALIST DEFENDS DOMINION

On Stump in Old London Denies Stories of Destitution in Canada.

London, Jan. 7.—Richard Jebb is in a triangular contest at East Marylebone. He is a tariff reform Unionist, his Conservative rival with being the Lord Robert Cecil, one of the leaders of the Free Trade Unionists. Leaders have appeared in the press pointing out that it will injure Jebb's influence in the colonies if he is badly treated at home. At last night's meeting, Jebb, being a newspaperman, then appeared on a platform and spoke in his behalf a journalist from Canada and one from Australia, J. M. McAdams, of Sarnia, and Frank Fox, of Melbourne, who denied the campaign stories about destitution in the colonies.

WOULD BE CANDIDATES FOR M. P. FOR OTTAWA

Several Aspire to the Seat Vacated by Sir Wilfrid Laurier of Both Parties.

Ottawa, Jan. 7.—The Ottawa Liberals will hold their convention this evening for the selection of a candidate to fill the vacancy created by the retirement of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. There are several men in the field, the nomination including Auguste Lemieux, a brother of the Postmaster-General, Dr. Chevrier, who received the nomination at the general election, but who was superseded by the Premier, Dr. Preval, Oscar Poyet, who is said to be favored by the Government; Emmanuel Tasse, who has not commended himself to a section of the party, owing to the fact that he was a Conservative until a few years ago, and ex-Mayor Payment.

The Conservatives issued notices this morning, calling their convention for Monday. The situation, so far as they are concerned, is complicated by the candidature of ex-Mayor Ellis as an Independent Conservative.

He announced that he will contest the election on the naval question. So far, no information is vouchsafed as to when the writ for the by-election will be issued.

A CLEVER RUSE

Detective Failed to Get Evidence of a Black Hand Murder.

Albany, N. Y., Jan. 6.—The incarceration of the New York detective in the Albany county jail for the purpose of securing evidence against Dominic Ferrar, charged with murder in the first degree, was brought to light today at the trial of Ferrar in the supreme court. The detective, Michael Bernabe, was arrested on his arrival in Albany on Dec. 2, in accordance with the plan arranged by the district attorney and sheriff of Albany County, arranged before the police magistrate and committed to jail until Dec. 22.

Bernabe was given a berth with Ferrar and Vincent Leonard, who are accused of having killed George E. Phelps, of Albany, a few months ago. Bernabe testified today that Ferrar admitted to him that he was a member of a branch of a Black Hand society, known as "The Family of the Dead Bodies," and that Phelps was murdered under orders from the society.

WARRING ON STEEL TRUST

American Federation of Labor Carries Fight to the White House.

Washington, Jan. 6.—The American Federation of Labor, through a committee headed by Samuel Gompers, James O'Connell and other union leaders, today carried its fight against the United States Steel Corporation to President Taft. The committee presented to the president a formal paper in which they set forth fourteen different charges of illegality against the steel corporation, and asked for an immediate investigation of the so-called trust, which, they claim, is operating in defiance of the United States statutes. The president promised to take the matter up with the secretary of commerce and labor, and with Labor Commissioner Noll.

FOR LOCAL OPTION BY COUNTIES

Ontario Moral Reform Council Wants Law Amended.

TO GO TO LEGISLATURE

Will Also Ask That Naturalization Laws Be Made More Stringent.

Toronto, Jan. 7.—The Ontario Moral Reform Council decided yesterday to ask the Provincial Legislature for a measure providing for local option by counties, including cities up to 25,000 inhabitants, and for local option by wards and districts in the larger cities.

It was felt that such a measure would greatly help places like Brantford, where the few votes lacking of the three-fifths would be amply made up by the vote in the county. It was also resolved to ask the Dominion Government to make the laws relating to naturalization of foreigners more stringent, the foreign vote being shown to be largely responsible for a number of defeats of local option.

The attendance at the meeting was large and representative, and much enthusiasm was manifested.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Honorary president, Rev. D. J. A. Turnbull; president, Right Rev. Bishop Sweeney; vice-president, Rev. J. B. Kennedy; joint secretaries, Revs. Dr. S. D. Chown and H. S. Magee; treasurer, Mr. C. F. Verity, Brantford.

THE BESSEMER RUINS COME TO THE SURFACE

Parts of the Vessel's Cabin and Other Timbers Beached at Long Point.

St. Thomas, Jan. 7.—Wreckage from the lost car ferry Bessemer No. 2 has been washed ashore at Long Point and other places along the beach. Charles Axford, of Yarmouth, who has been visiting at Long Point, says the farmers are hauling away wagonloads of timbers and lumber which had been cast up on the beach. Some of the wreckage was in masses about 12x14 feet or more, and was evidently parts of cabin partitions. The loads were painted green, the color of the woodwork of the Bessemer. Bits of furniture were also scattered about, and the man secured the E-shaped piece of metal on which the lifeboats rest when on board.

The general opinion at Long Point is that the Bessemer No. 2 went down about the centre of the lake, and if found, will be located at no great distance off her regular course.

STRATHCONA JOINS FIGHT AGAINST FEVER

Cabled \$25,000 to Help in Combat With Typhoid at Montreal.

Montreal, Jan. 7.—Lord Strathcona cabled \$25,000 yesterday for the emergency typhoid hospital, which has just been created out of a factory by the activity of a number of citizens, and offered a further \$100,000 to start a fund for the installation of means to prevent further outbreaks of the disease.

This magnificent donation, coupled with some \$20,000 already contributed here, assures the committee in charge of ample funds.

Already cases are coming in so fast that it seems but a question of days before the new emergency hospital's capacity of 100 beds is filled, and a move is on foot to establish a second emergency hospital. The Bell Telephone Company today offered the company a second vacant factory for this purpose, and arrangements are under way to equip it at once.

PALACE OF A KING GUTTED BY FIRE

Royal Grecian Residence Near Athens Was Partially Destroyed.

Athens, Jan. 7.—A fire broke out in the royal palace, about two miles from Athens, at 10 o'clock last night. This is the eve of the Greek Christmas, and the king and his family were gathered around a Christmas tree when the alarm was given. Two outbreaks occurred in an upper story. Various causes are suggested, but the fire was accidental.

Valuable archives, including relics of the war of independence, were saved. The fire service provided was inadequate. Sailors from the British and Russian warships in Phalarum Bay arrived to help. There were no personal casualties. The palace was a new and handsome building set in a beautiful park.

OTTAWA POLICE HEAD FACES SERIOUS CHARGE

Ottawa, Jan. 6.—Major De La Ronde, chief of police and commanding officer of No. 5 Company, Army Service Corps, was today charged with misappropriation of funds alleged to have taken place during the visit of No. 5 Company to the Quebec Tercentenary. Lieuts. Pinard and Spittal, two of the officers of the company, were the men who laid the information.

The first charge laid alleges that the pay sheets for the company's time in the Quebec tercentenary, signed by Major De La Ronde, were falsified in certain respects.

They also charge that he drew pay for horses and men at Quebec and camp which were not there. The chief's arrest is not asked for until the charges are heard at the police court on Wednesday.

WOMAN WITH A GUN HALTS A LYNCHING

A Mob of 150 Held at Bay and Their Victim Is Rescued As He Swings From Rafter.

Kenosha, Wis., Jan. 7.—Standing off an infuriated mob of 150 men with a shotgun, Mrs. Sarah Andell, wife of John Andell, a boarding-house keeper, at Twin Lakes, in the western part of Kenosha County, cut the rope with which Sam Roberts, cook at an ice-cutting camp, had been swung to a rafter in an icehouse, just in time to save the man from death by strangulation. The attempt to lynch Roberts followed a quarrel between union and non-union men.

As soon as she had freed Roberts' neck from the noose about it, Mrs. Andell screamed for aid. About 20 friends of the mob's victim rushed to his rescue and after a desperate battle rescued him, more dead than alive. Roberts was hurried to the Andell home and was later sent to Milwaukee, where it was found that three of his ribs had been broken and that his body was a mass of bruises as the result of the rough treatment he had received at the hands of his enemies.

PUBLIC LIBRARY REPORTS FOR YEAR GRATIFYING

Final Meeting of Old Board Was Held Last Night.

The final meeting of the library board was held in Librarian Carson's office last night, and the reports submitted for the year were of a most gratifying nature. Notwithstanding many improvements that have been made during the year, and the constant addition of new books, the board ends the year with a surplus of \$75.72. The financial statement was as follows:

Receipts—Surplus, 1908, \$191.61; Government grant, \$250; rents, \$229; desk receipts, \$128.55; city appropriation, \$10,682. Total, \$11,780.56.
Expenditures—Debt charges, \$2,132.88; books, \$2,422.29; periodicals, \$452.29; binding, \$642.94; building and repairs, \$124.24; furniture, \$175.11; insurance, \$271.20; light, heat and water, \$736.83; salaries, \$3,810; printing, \$189.05; incidentals, \$619.22; stationery, \$148.46; surplus, \$75.72. Total, \$11,780.56.

Rev. Mr. Sage's Address.

Rev. Dr. G. B. Sage, chairman of the board, whose term expired last night but who was again reappointed by the board of education before the meeting closed, in reviewing the work of the board for the past year, pointed to many improvements, mentioning especially the introduction of the second card system. The membership of the library, he pointed out, had been completely renewed, and during the past three years the circulation has doubled, the increase during the past year alone being 20 per cent. During the year 2,435 new books have been placed on the shelves and 600 old books withdrawn from circulation. The total number of books now in the library is 24,600, and the use of reference works is noticeably increasing. The number of works in this department has been materially added to. The increase in the circulation is 200 per cent.

Dr. W. F. Tambllyn, registrar of the Western University, wrote, thanking the board for the assistance that the library has been to the university during the year.

Library Committee.

The report of the library committee for the month of December showed that the circulation for the month was 10,900, the previous record being membership 4,899, and a number of second cards in use 559. The accounts for the month amounted to \$349.24. During the month the Young Men's Christian Church of the Wortley Road Baptist Church visited the library, and the committee expressed the wish that the societies of other churches would come also.

BRIBERY LEGAL IN LOCAL OPTION FIGHTS

Provincial Secretary Discovers Peculiar Overlapping of the Laws.

Toronto, Jan. 7.—By a peculiar defect in the overlapping of the liquor license and municipal acts, bribery, in relation to local option contests in Ontario, is legal. Whatever may be the moral aspect of the offence or its status in common law, there is nothing in the provincial statutes to prohibit or punish the practice of influencing or bribing of voters on local option votes.

This startling discovery was only made recently and was submitted to Hon. W. J. Hanna, the provincial secretary, with a view to securing an immediate amendment to the act covering the point in question. The change will probably be made at the forthcoming session of the Legislature.

FATAL PITTSBURG FIRE.

Pittsburg, Jan. 7.—Two persons were killed, another was seriously injured and twelve others rescued from a fire which destroyed a frame dwelling house occupied by three families of foreigners. The dead were Mrs. Mary Amundson, aged 40 years, and her son, aged 7 months.
