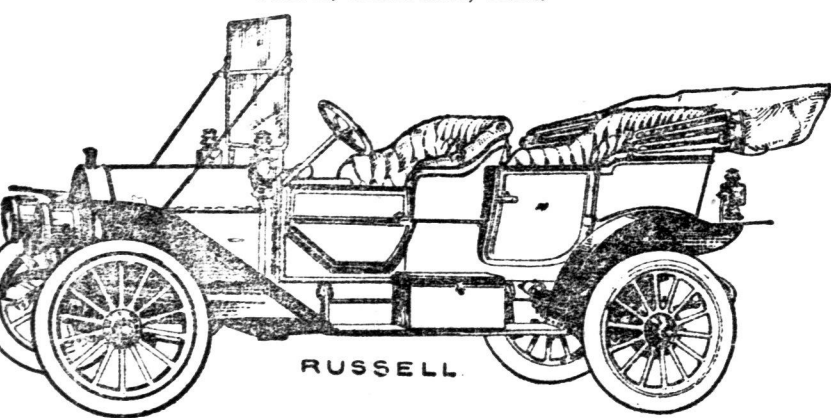

NEWS AT A GLANCE

Happenings From the Whole Country Told Briefly.

In Ottawa during October there were issued 63 building permits, representing buildings of an estimated value of \$438,925. In October, 1909, there were 72 permits, the estimated value being \$341,169.

John E. Brennan was given over to the custody of Jailer McDougall at Brockville, Ont., to serve one month in default of a fine of \$50 imposed by the police magistrate of Gananoque, who found him guilty of supplying liquor to a man on the prohibited list. Riding on the backs of sheep, and injuring the animals by doing so, was the charge to which three young boys pleaded guilty in the juvenile court at Ottawa. The magistrate imposed a fine of \$2 and \$2 costs, which he suspended over the would-be Buffalo Bills pending their future good behavior.

That Ottawa's milk supply is at present very good, reported by Food Inspector Hollingsworth to the board of health. Out of 361 supplies of milk collected during the summer for inspection, there were nine deficient in butter fat, and 29 in total solids. In all cases the real reason that milk was not up to the standard was that some of the dairymen do not properly stir it. There is no adulteration whatever, and the dairy farms in the district all comply with sanitary conditions.

Subscriptions to the Salvation Army building fund at Brockville now amount to \$4,019.

At Richmond, Que., work has been commenced on the roof of the new G. T. R. shops which are now under construction. It is expected that they will be ready by Feb. 1.

Dr. J. E. Macpherson, of Metcalfe, has been appointed house surgeon at the Ottawa Civic Hospital. Hospital to succeed Dr. Fenton, who has gone west. He is a graduate of Queen's.

Consumers of milk in Ottawa are criticised by Food Inspector Hollingsworth for using milk bottles for other purposes than holding milk. Some use the milk bottles for holding cold oil, in fact, anything that they can use them for. They are later returned to the dairymen, but in spite of efforts to clean the bottles the materials are fairly embedded into the glass, and it is impossible to get them absolutely clean.

There passed away at Presque Isle Point, near Brighton, Ont., a pioneer in the person of Mr. Wm. Mason. He was born in Wales. It is stated that he put the first load of gravel on the Kingston-Toronto road. He assisted also in building the Grand Trunk Railway, and served his country during the Fenian raid. About 33 years ago he settled on Presque Isle Point.

The hydro-electric power commission is endeavoring to secure power from companies in the eastern portion of Ontario for a number of municipalities which have applied for it. The following municipalities have asked for estimates of the prices they will have to pay for electric energy: Kingston, 2,500 horsepower; Deseronto, 300 horsepower; Belleville, 3,200 horsepower; Brockville, 500 to 1,000 horsepower; Shawan, 500 horsepower; Cobourg, 800 horsepower; Bowmanville, 600 horsepower; Picton, 500 horsepower; Durham, 2,000 horsepower.

Captain Louis Robideau, of East Cornwall, formerly a well-known man, is dead. He was 73 years old, and leaves two sons and five daughters, his wife having died some years ago.

At Sudbury the Bank of Toronto expects to soon move into handsome new quarters.

Richard Kearns, of Peterboro, had an arm badly crushed in the C. P. R. yards there.

The two Steele brothers, reported drowned in a gale at Millhaven, have turned up safely.

Patrick Nolan, of St. Bride's, Nfld., had his hand blown off by the explosion of a shotgun.

E. H. Colman, of the Sudbury staff of the Traders' Bank, has been transferred to Winnipeg.

As a matter of life sentence passed on Sgt. Manley for bayoneting a spectator at a parade, the Texas National Guard is demoralized, many officers resigning and companies asking to be disbanded.

Matthew McGowan, a laborer at the Canada Rubber Company's building in Toronto, stepped into an open elevator, dislocated his shoulder and cutting his head.

A big paper mill is projected for St. John, N. B.

Alex. McLean, of Steelton, has been appointed town treasurer.

John Thomson, 44 years, postmaster of Woodford, has resigned.

Ex-Ald. Senger, an old resident of Windsor, was found dead in a chair.

St. John, N. B., had 776 deaths in the twelve months ending Oct. 31.

William Wormswart, of Arden, is suffering from wounds received when his gun accidentally exploded while he was out duck hunting.

VICTORY OF DEMOCRATS A POPULAR ONE HERE

Great Rejoicing Amongst American Visitors Over Dix's Win in New York.

There was a marked local interest taken in yesterday's American elections, especially as to New York State.

The influence of Roosevelt in the campaign was followed closely, as the voting was considered a test of his strength as a presidential possibility in 1912.

Naturally the American guests at the hotels were particularly interested in the results. Democratic supporters appeared to be in a majority, and when news of Dix's victory was received there was a great rejoicing.

"The Republicans broke faith with the people on the tariff," said one visitor. "This told against them heavily, and it undoubtedly elected the Democrats."

"In New York State, the old guard of the Republican party was intensely bitter towards Roosevelt, and voted the Democratic ticket in large numbers. They did not relish the beating he gave them at the convention, and rather than see him win, they booted the ticket."

The race-track men and Wall street interests were against Stimson, and both are powerful factors. The vote shows that in the rural districts, where Governor Hughes received the bulk of his support against the race-tracks, the polling was strongly Democratic.

The re-election of Governor Harmon, the Democrats' choice, was the most-talked-of candidate for the presidency on the Democratic side, and several of the travellers declared that Ohio would add another son to the list of presidents.

One of the most interested men in the campaign in this city was Mr. Charles W. McGuire. His brother-in-law, Mr. Samuel R. Sells, was a candidate for Congress for the first electoral district of Tennessee. Word came quite early in the evening that he had been elected by a handsome majority. Mr. Sells was formerly a member of the State Legislature.

Setbacks to "T. R."

The defeat of Stimson in New York, Senator Beveridge in Indiana, and the election of Speaker Joe Cannon are considered the most vital setbacks to Roosevelt in all these three states he worked hard for.

"Roosevelt has received a setback," said one admirer. "They have not got rid of him, however, and he will continue to be a force in American politics."

Londoners generally appeared pleased at the defeat of the Republicans. One of the most interested was Mr. Christopher, the well-known horseman, who is at present a resident in this city. Months ago he predicted a Democratic landslide, returning to New York Monday in order to help defeat Stimson.

Hydro Power Row

ON AT BROCKVILLE

Council Has Refused the Offer Made By Commission.

Toronto, Nov. 8.—A dispatch from Brockville states that the residents of that place are dissatisfied with the treatment they have received from the hydro-electric commission. At the meeting of the town council last night the commissioner's offer to supply power was refused.

When sent about it, Hon. Adam Beck, chairman of the commission, made the following statement:

"The commission received applications for the power to be produced from Brockville, Prescott and Morrisburg. The prices quoted to Brockville were: 1,000 horsepower, \$49.39; 2,000 horsepower, \$30.43; 3,000 horsepower, \$27.83; requiring capital investments of \$260,870, \$281,320 and \$322,530 respectively. Since these estimates were given to Brockville the commission has received an application from Kingston for 3,000 horsepower. Should the line be extended to Kingston, or other points, further reductions can be made in the price of power to Brockville."

Mr. Beck regretted that residents of Brockville felt that they had been neglected by the commission, which was always anxious to investigate thoroughly the requirements of any district applying for a supply of power.

"There is no doubt," concluded Mr. Beck, "that as soon as the building of the transmission line is decided upon, other municipalities will apply, and the price of power to Kingston, Prescott and Brockville will be materially reduced."

LEADER SAM LANDERS HAD NARROW ESCAPE

Frenzied Chicago Strikers Threatened Canadian Union Man.

Samuel L. Landers, the Canadian Labor leader, narrowly escaped being mobbed by striking garment workers at a meeting held in Casino Hall, Chicago, when the agreement entered into by the union organizers and a large firm was rejected by the strikers.

The Chicago Tribune has the following to say about the matter:

"By practically unanimous action, 40,000 striking garment workers in a number of mass meetings yesterday repudiated an arbitration agreement signed by President Thomas A. Rickert, of their own national organization and officers of a large firm. The rejection of the agreement puts the strike back where it was before the peace negotiations were started."

"Wild demonstrations of protest greeted the announcement that the agreement was signed."

"When Rickert emerged from the hall he looked flushed and worried."

"Three people repudiated the agreement," said he.

"Then he went to several other meetings, where similar receptions were given him. At a meeting in Casino Hall, Twelfth and Union streets, Samuel L. Landers of Hamilton, Ont., a member of the international executive board, was forced back against a wall to ward off the angry strikers, who threatened to attack him after he had explained the agreement and recommended its adoption."

"The crowd was wild," said Landers.

ers. "I had all I could do to get away from them. I could do nothing with them. They simply howled me and the agreement down, and I had to get out."

MR. BEAUPARLANT ON RECENT BY-ELECTION

Says Campaign Was a Most Unscrupulous One.

Quebec, Nov. 8.—Mr. Beauparlant, M. P. for St. Hyacinthe, in an interview given on the recent Drummond-Arthabaska fight, said:

"I admit that the electorate of Drummond-Arthabaska has condemned the creation of a Canadian navy, but it has been done after the most unscrupulous campaign ever made on a question of sentiment. The rural population has been misled by the Nationalists' sophisms. We don't fear to continue to teach the people the real bearing of the marine law, and I am sure that before two years the electors will be sufficiently taught to do away with the false appeals of Mr. Bourassa. This defeat has increased the zeal of the old defenders of the old Liberalism. When the day of vengeance will come it will be terrible."

BACK TO WARD SYSTEM.

Windsor, Nov. 8.—Windsor will revert to the ward system of choosing aldermen at the approaching municipal elections, with the four wards into which the city was divided before the general vote was adopted instead of with the six ward division planned by the city council this year. In the coming election three representatives from each of the four wards will be chosen.

chosen instead of two from each of six. From present indications it is likely that under the ward system there will be a much larger field of aldermanic candidates than last year.

DOUBLE DROWNING

Lumbermen Met Death When Their Raft Broke Up.

Halifax, N. S., Nov. 8.—A double drowning accident occurred near Port Creville last night.

George Dorsey and Everett Allen left Fraserville for Port Creville yesterday afternoon with a boat and raft of piling.

This morning the body of Dorsey was found at the mouth of Ratchford River near his overturned and broken boat. Allen's body has not been found. Piling from the raft is scattered along the shore above Fraserville, and it is supposed that when the raft broke up the men tried to reach Port Creville, and that their boat struck a sandbar near the river mouth and capsized.

Dorsey, who was a strong swimmer, evidently tried to reach the shore and nearly succeeded. Allen probably sank at once and was swept away by the strong current.

Both men were married, and Dorsey leaves a family.

TENDER FOR CANADA-AUSTRALIA MAIL.

Ottawa, Nov. 7.—The Union Steamship Company, it is officially announced, submitted the only tender for the service on the Pacific between Canada and Australia. No contract will be awarded, however, until the Australian Government, which is a party to it, is communicated with, and cables are now being exchanged.

The Union Company at present has the contract. The tender submitted involves several proposals and the character of the service as regards size of ships and speed will depend upon which proposition is acted upon.
