as a way out of the dilemma in which Greece now finds herself and as means of restoring the prestige of King Constantine. The calculation is madby the Patris of Athens, that the forces lined up on the Austrian side in the Balkans is only slightly more than 200,000. The Greek army, supplied with munitions by the Allies, would be well able to cope with these forces, it is affirmed.

Must Regain Prestige. "Mr. Venizelos, whose return to power is believed to be imminent, has emphasized in a series of articles in the Athens Herald, the necessity of governmental action to regain the lost prestige of the nation. He intimates that the continuance of the Greek dynasty at the head of the nation is comprised in his party's plans for rapid modification of the previously existing conditions.
