BELFAST, Jan. 15.—The Irish municipal elections, which were fought out for the first time today under the proportional representation system in 126 boroughs and urban council areas created great excitement.

Although the Sinn Fein candidates are in the majority in many areas the issues are complicated by the appearance of the municipal reformers and other parties with numerous women ance of the municipal reformers and other parties with numerous women candidates. Among these were Mrs. F. H. Sheehy-Skeffington, Mrs. T. M. Kettie and Mrs. Alice Ginnell.

In Dublin alone 153 candidates were running for eighty vacancies. These included the following:

Sinn Fein 61, Municipal Reformers 14, Nationalists and Laborites 2. The latter parties were working together.

The results of the elections will be announced next Saturday.






