**Non-Jury Sitings.**  
The non-jury sittings of the High Court  
opened Monday afternoon at the court  
house, Sarnia, before Mr. Justice Teetzel.  
The greater part of the litigation came from  
Petrolia this time. There were six cases  
entered on the docket, but two of them had  
been settled, and were only mentioned to  
the court for the purpose of having the  
settlements entered up. Logan v. Logan,  
which has been on the list for several sit-  
ings, was again postponed, a settlement  
having been made, but not carried out.  
Wilson vs. Douglas—After a few minutes  
spent in the formal disposition of the last  
two cases, the remainder of Monday and  
Tuesday forenoon were taken up with this  
action. It is a capital illustration of the  
folly of employing unprofessional men to do  
professional work. The lawyers, however,  
are not, we understand, complaining, as the  
steps made by non-professional conveyanc-  
ers, especially in drawing wills, results in  
fat suits, of which this case was an example.  
One John Crooks being near death's door,  
he was in Michigan or Ontario. He let  
all his property in Ontario and Michi-  
gan, where he had formerly resided, to his  
half-sister, Mrs. James Douglas, of Brooke,  
with whom he was then residing. Unfor-  
tunately the person who drew the will al-  
lowed Mr. Jas. Douglas to be a witness to  
the will, which under the law of Ontario,  
rendered the gifts to his wife void. For  
the defence it was contended that John  
Crooks was only in Ontario on a visit, and  
that under the law of Michigan, where, it  
was contended, he was domiciled, such a  
gift was good. It was therefore important  
to determine whether the testator's domicile  
was in Michigan or Ontario. A commis-  
ion was taken in Michigan, and the evi-  
dence of two Michigan lawyers was taken  
in regard to the law of that state. The  
legatee also set up a gift of the money in  
Ontario to her by the testator in his life-  
time; and further contended that, owing to  
peculiar family circumstances, none of her  
brothers and sisters could inherit anything  
from the estate of John Crooks, if there  
was an intestacy. At the request of the  
court a settlement was arrived at. Mr. T.  
Douglas and her husband agreeing to make  
a substantial cash payment to the plaintiff,  
in settlement. Mr. Weir and Mr. Le-  
Sueur were counsel for the plaintiff; Mr.  
W. J. Hazza being her solicitor. Mr. T.  
G. Meredith, K. C., and Mr. Judd, both of  
London, for Mrs. Douglas and her husband,  
and also for two other sisters. Mr. G. D.  
represented the official guardian on behalf  
of an infant son. Mr. Logan appeared for  
the Attorney-General in the interest of the  
province in the event of the estate escheav-  
ing to the Crown. Mr. S. T. Whittaker  
represented four other members of the  
family. Two other lawyers were  
called as witnesses. In the result, the  
testator could have paid a very fat fee to  
the most eminent lawyer in Canada for  
drawing his will, and his estate still be  
many hundred dollars ahead.

**Knittle v. Petrolia.**—This case when re-  
sumed occupied all of Wednesday forenoon.  
It seems that a culvert had been put in,  
the wooden covering of which was some 16  
inches below the level of the highway. The  
depression was filled with earth, which  
remained loose and after rain worked into a  
hole. Mr. Knittle had been a passenger in  
a wagon over this piece of highway in the  
morning, there was rain during the fore-  
noon. On his return he was thrown out of  
the wagon when it struck this hole, and so  
injured that he died in a few days. The  
defence contended that there was no negli-  
gence, that the highway was for a day  
road in good repair, that the construction  
of the culvert was usual and proper, that  
the wagon was unsafe to ride in over clay  
roads, and that Knittle had been drinking.  
Three engineers were examined regarding  
the way in which the culvert was construc-  
ed. They agreed substantially that the  
construction was defective. Mr. Justice  
Teetzel decided that the highway was out  
of repair, that the defects therein caused  
the accident, and awarded the widow  
\$1,000.00 damages and costs. Mr. Green-  
izen, Petrolia, for the plaintiff; Mr. F. W.  
Wilson, Petrolia, for the defendant.

**Josh v. Sutherland.**—The plaintiff sued  
the defendant for wages. It seems that the  
latter was an Englishman, who came to  
Petrolia, and for a time represented a com-  
pany. Subsequently he was arrested on a  
capias when passing through Ontario, he  
could not be absent to quit the province with-  
out the intent to defraud his creditors. In the  
present action he counterclaimed against the  
plaintiff for damages for false arrest. The  
court held that the plaintiff was not em-  
ployed by the defendant personally, but by  
the company he represented, and dismissed  
the claim for wages. The defendant was  
awarded \$100.00 damages for the false ar-  
rest. Mr. Greenizen, Petrolia, for plain-  
tiff; Mr. Matthew Wilson, K. C., of Chat-  
ham, for the defendant.
