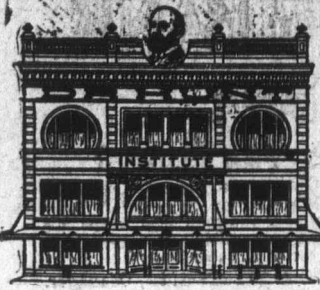

New Regulations and Course of Studies.

Copies of the new regulations and courses of study for Public and High Schools have been distributed by the Education Department. An examination of them reveals a number of important changes.
Grammar is no longer on the course of study for the Third Classes of our Public Schools, and the course in this subject for Fourth Classes has been considerably simplified.
The course in Geography for all classes in the Public Schools has been radically changed, physical commercial and economic Geography is to receive much greater attention than it has received in the past.
An effort is to be made to adapt the course of study in each school to the needs and the special conditions of the locality. In schools with only one teacher the trustees may substitute for Art and Nature study one or more of the following subjects: Domestic Science, Manual Training, Elementary Agriculture.
Physical Culture is obligatory in all classes of the Public schools, and a manual will shortly be issued by the Education Department for the guidance of the teacher in taking up this subject.
A two years' course of study is outlined for Fifth Classes. On completing the first year's course a pupil may take an examination which will entitle him to a Junior Graduation Diploma, and at the end of the second year's course an examination for a Senior Graduation Diploma. Both these examinations will be conducted by the Education Department and either Diplomas will admit the pupil to a High School.
The character and scope of the Entrance Examination is unchanged, but in future it will be known as the Junior High School Entrance Examination. This examination loses much of its importance from the fact that there are now three other ways of securing admission to a High School, namely: (1) By means of a Junior Graduation Diploma, (2) By means of a Senior Graduation Diploma, and (3) By passing the Senior High School Entrance Examination. The latter examination admits the candidate to the middle school of the High School.
With a view to securing more favorable weather conditions, the foregoing examinations and also the examinations for admission to the Faculties of Education and the Normal Schools are to be completed by the 30th of June.

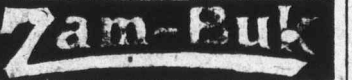
To Serve With Meat.

For example, if a man at present aged 40 years were to deposit with the Canadian Government \$1 a week until he was 65 for the purpose of buying a Canadian Government Annuity, he would receive \$261 a year for the remainder of his days. And if he died before he was 65 what he had paid in accumulated at 3% compound interest would be refunded to his heirs. Full particulars concerning the scheme may be had by any one over the age of five years if he or she will apply to the Superintendent of Canadian Government Annuities, Ottawa.
