While it is not generally considered a good practice to breed these lambs until they are one and one half years old, yet many sheep raisers have with success bred them when they are only lambs. At the present juncture when there is such an urgent demand for sheep products this practice is in general to be recommended with those ewe lambs that are well grown. While the ewes may be somewhat stunted in growth, yet the owner will derive quicker returns from his investment, and the country will be richer by as much extra wool and mutton as the progeny of those ewes will produce.
