Friction of wood on metal, rubbing between stones, &c., are of no avail. Its preparation also is more readily effected; the ingredients simply require powdering and mixing. and it can be kept for any time without change. Its explosion is more energetic in its action than ordinary powder; it approaches gun-cotton in this respect .- Med. and Surg. Reporter.
