WHEAT-ANNOUNCEMENT OF SALES TO POLAND AND BULGARIA

Hon. Mitchell Sharp (Minister of Trade and Commerce): Mr. Speaker, the Canadian wheat board is announcing in Winnipeg today that it has negotiated contracts for the sale of approximately 200,000 metric tons of wheat for shipment to Poland and 50,000 metric tons of wheat for shipment to Bulgaria. The sale to Poland, totalling about 7,400,000 bushels, is for shipment during the period August to November, 1964. This is the third sale made to Poland under the provisions of the long term agreement signed on November 5, 1963, and represents a preshipment of part of the wheat Poland has agreed to buy during the second year of the three year agreement.
