PRESENTATION OF SECOND REPORT OF STANDING COMMITTEE

Mr. Bob Brisco (Kootenay West): Mr. Speaker, I have the honour to present, in both official languages, the second report of the Standing Committee on Environment and Forestry entitled *The Argument for Integrated Forest and Wildlife Management in Canada*. Pursuant to Standing Order 99(2), the committee requests a comprehensive response.

The committee convened a day of stimulating public hearings, bringing together representatives of the wildlife conservation movement, the forestry sector, native groups, the federal Government, and academia, to address the urgent issues of harmonizing the objectives of forestry management and wildlife conservation.

It is the opinion of the committee that the time to take action has come. Goals consistent with sustainable development must be developed in order to achieve a rational use ethic for forest resources that would preserve both forests and wildlife.

The committee also recommends that federal-provincial forest resource development agreements include integrated wildlife and forestry objectives which would ensure achievement of those goals.
