

And whereas this curtailment of fishing licences to Japanese fishermen was only carried out until 1927 when no further steps were taken to safeguard the industry for white Canadian fishermen,

Therefore be it Resolved,—That, in the opinion of this House, as the fishing industry in British Columbia is still today largely in the hands of Japanese fishermen, and particularly in the Fraser River area, all fishing licences issued to Japanese, or those of Japanese origin, be reduced by not less than 40 per cent during the present year and by 15 per cent in each year following, and continued until such time as the recommendation made by the Royal Commission is carried out and the fishing industry of British Columbia in the hands of white Canadian fishermen.

*Mr. Gladstone*—On Monday next—The following proposed Resolution:—That a Special Committee be appointed to consider with Mr. Speaker the advisability of revising the Rules of the House.

*Mr. Heaps*—On Monday next—The following proposed Resolution:—Whereas it is becoming more and more difficult for older persons to be absorbed into the useful productive life of the Dominion thereby being unable to maintain themselves in decency and comfort;

And whereas, Canada is a country richly endowed with natural resources, capable of maintaining our whole population in a reasonably high standard of living,

Therefore be it Resolved,—That this House would welcome a Government declaration of policy that would bring about an immediate lowering of the present pensionable age limit of seventy years, the effect of such being that the older generation would retire from industrial activity, thereby creating opportunities for the younger generation to be usefully and gainfully employed.

*Mr. Church*—On Monday next—The following proposed Resolution:—That, in the opinion of this House, the Government be requested to consider making Direct Relief, and also in part, urgent relief works, a federal responsibility entirely and not a municipal or provincial one, notwithstanding the provisions of any law, statute, usage or custom to the contrary;

And also consider a new measure of constitutional reform adapted to Canada's present-day circumstances so as to afford a more ready, just, equitable and more immediate remedy and basis of dealing with all of Canada's social services of all and every kind, thus providing a quicker solution of the same and more equality of treatment for all the provinces of Confederation on the principle of each for all and all for each;

And, if deemed advisable, a Select Committee of the House be appointed to make a study and review of the whole question and report back to the House as quickly as possible.

*Mr. McIvor*—On Monday next—The following proposed Resolution:—That, in the opinion of this House, it is most urgent that State medicine be established in the Dominion of Canada.

*Mr. Blackmore*—On Monday next—The following proposed Resolution:—That, in the opinion of this House, the Canadian Government should consider the advisability of beginning this year to issue purchasing power and to use that purchasing power for the improvement of the economic condition of the Canadian people.
