

(6)-It should be very clearly understood that the new development does not imply the least hostility to the teaching of the civil law and the preparation of men for the Quebec Bar. This work is and must remain the first charge upon the energies of the Faculty, and its efficiency should be stimulated by the presence of a strong common law school. The converse is also true --that the opportunity of studying the civil law at close quarters is one of the strongest attractions which we can offer to students from other jurisdictions. Each side of our work stands to gain by the efficiency of the other.

(7)-The position of Montreal gives us the opportunity of buiding up a law school in which both the civil law and the ~~XXXX~~ common law systems can be taught with the maximum of efficiency, as it will be possible to study them in actual operation side by side. If such a school is created, it will be absolutely unique in the world, and the possibilities arising from its development are almost incalculable.
