Hitherto the exertions of public men have been confined within the limits of contracted localities; but now, as every avenue of learning is thrown open to the young men of the country, and the opportunity of obtaining a liberal education is far greater than it was a few years ago, a more extended stage for action should be afforded to them. The plan I propose offers that great advantage, and I venture to predict, in the event of its being carried out, that in the course of a very few years statesmen will spring up in British North America who would be considered an honour and a credit to any country.
