ENGLAND WINS ELCHO MATCH.

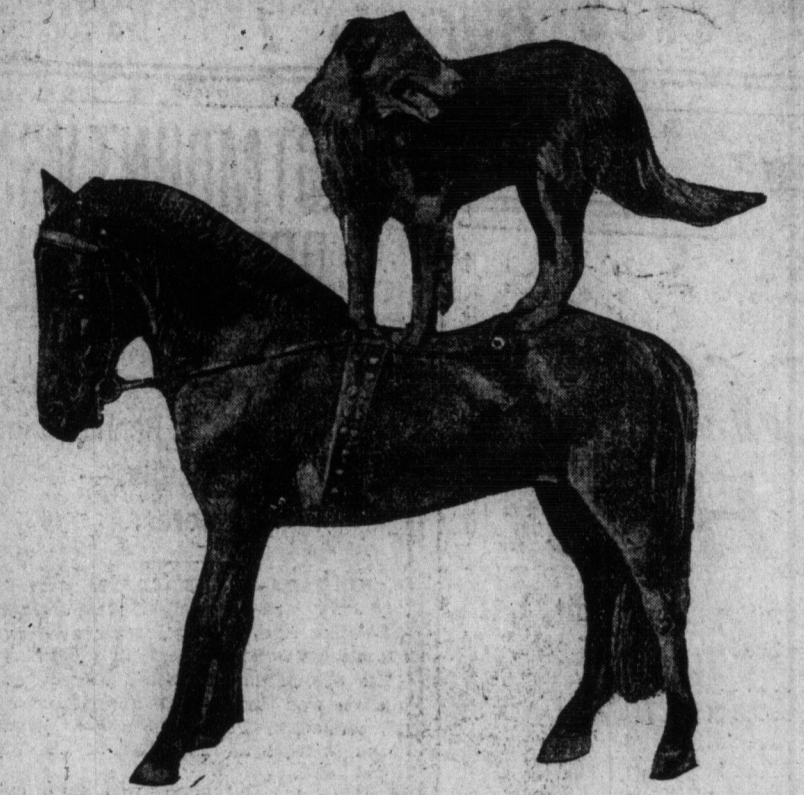

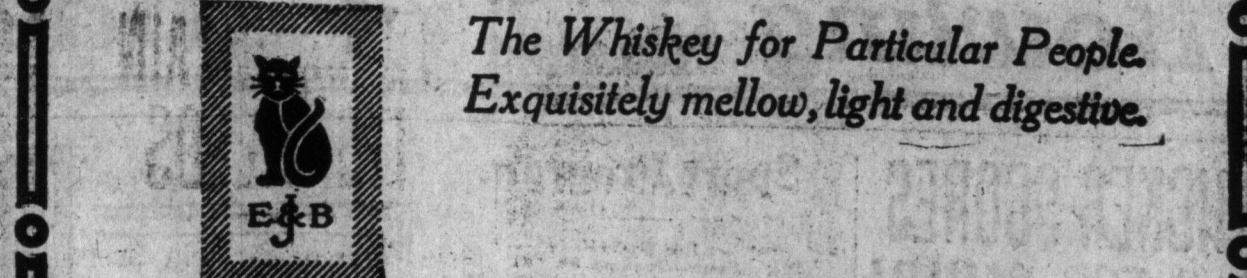
