Sold Baseball Stars: Lost in Gate Receipts

Connie Mack has received a fortune for former stars of the Athletics. He sold Eddie Collins for \$30,000, Frank Baker for \$27,000, Jack Barry for \$20,000, Bob Shawkey for \$5,000, Jack Lapp for \$3,000, and he has added to this list by making the recent big deal with the Red Sox in which it was announced that he got \$50,000 for Joe Bush, Amos Strunk and Wes Schaefer. The last-named figures are probably grossly exaggerated, but he got a big sum of money at that. Mack, therefore, has cleared up around \$150,000 since he decided to tear his great base-ball machine apart in 1915.

Yet it is believed that as a result of his new policy the Athletics have lost at least the much in gate the past three years. Attendance fell off painfully when it was seen that Mack was selling his crack players for big sums. Last year the fans began to return to Shibe park, believing that the foxy general was mak-ing an earnest effort to build up an-other winning club. But the sale of the three best players to Boston has hurt the Athletics and the Athletics are likely to play to empty seats this year.

Mack, of course, has an argument on his side. He figures that his team would run in the second division this year at the best, and would not attract great crowds. He also foresees a nose dive falling off in business on account of the war and he thought it was better to get some coin in hand than to take a chance on getting by in a season which may turn out to be rather disastrous. Yet the simple fact remains, as proven by the experience of the Athletics, that it doesn't pay a club to sell off its star players.

Philadelphians are very prone over the sale of the three Athletics stars, as well as over the deal for Alexander and Kilfer. They make no secret of their displeasure and openly charge that the owners of the two clubs have erased their city from the baseball map. One writer says that the sale of the three Athletics stars has quit, while the other fourteen major league clubs have elected to stand the gaff of war-time and take their chances. This sentiment can only be ap-pressed by long winning streaks for the Quakers and Athletics, which do not look very likely at this distance.

YINGLING CAN NOW PLAY.

Cincinnati, Ohio, Jan. 4.—The National Baseball Commission announced today that Pitcher Earl Yingling, who has been carried on the roster of the Washington Club of the American League as a volun-tarily retired player, has notified the commission that he is desirous of enter-ing the service of the club next season. In reinstating Yingling the commission says: "As the player's explanation of his failure to report to the Washington Club last year in confirmed by President Minor, who unites in his request, he is hereby restored to active standing."

GUELPH SHIVERS; FUTURE IS DARK

Little Coal in City and Mayor's Efforts at Relief Unavailing.

Guelph, Ont., Jan. 4.—There is immediate relief forthcoming in the matter of coal a number of householders in this city will either have a double supply of coal today, and the situation was never more acute. Mayor Newstead's office was fairly besieged all day long with men and women who are down to their last shovelful of coal, and after visiting all the dealers and failing to get coal, came to the mayor as the last resort. In some cases already, there has been actual suffering, and the mayor is seeking the necessary authority from Ottawa to deal with the supply, on the one hand, and compel those dealers who are only giving the coal to the regular customers to give it to those who have no coal.

According to the customs returns 55 cars of coal came into the city during the month of December and the number one dealer received 24 cars more than all the rest. It was reported that he had 500 tons of coal yesterday and word to this effect was sent to R. C. Harris, deputy fuel controller, Toronto, who at once wired this dealer that he must co-operate to relieve the critical situation or his license would be canceled. His answer was that he only had 50 tons on hand and that he was doing all he could.

A meeting of the ministerial association was held this afternoon in the mayor's office, and they expressed a willingness to do everything possible to co-operate in the conserving of the coal by cutting out some of their mid-week services and combining their Sunday services. There are many appeals in the city tonight where there is not enough coal to keep the people warm, and in some cases children are being kept in bed in order to keep them from suffering from the cold.

SAT FOURTEEN HOURS

Chatham Board Makes Heroic Effort to Clear Up Apples.

Chatham, Jan. 4.—His Lordship Justice McGeoghegan and Major Weeks of London, Ontario, who are on a tour of inspection in this city, sat for fourteen hours yesterday, the session lasting until midnight last night, in an endeavor to finish the review of the situation of the city, which have been made by draftsmen in this city. The cases will probably be finished tomorrow.

Very few exemptions are being allowed, although the extension of time being granted in many cases for domestic reasons.

Deserter of a Year Arrested; Was Hiding on Farm in Harwich
