BRITISH FIRE CRUSHES  
ATTEMPT NEAR LOCRE

London, April 29.—The war office reports: "The hostile attack reported developing yesterday afternoon in the neighborhood of Locre was repulsed by rifle and machine gun fire. A heavy bombardment with high explosives and gas shells was opened by the enemy this morning on the whole front from Metz to Yvermezele, and infantry attacks are now developing. The hostile artillery has also shown great activity during the night from the River Scarpe to Lens, and between Givenchy and the Forest of Nieppe. By a successful enterprise carried out by us last night, the post in the neighborhood of Festubert, captured by the enemy on the night of April 26-27, was retaken by us, together with over fifty prisoners and four machine guns were also secured by us in successful raids south of Albert and in the neighborhood of Neuville-Vitasse."

FINNS BREAK TREATY  
OF PEACE WITH RUSSIA

Washington, April 29.—Finnish shore batteries in command of German officers opened fire on 145 Russian ships which left Helsingfors for Kronstadt, the state department was informed today in diplomatic dispatches. This was held to be a violation of the Brest-Litovsk treaty, which stipulated that the vessels should move unimpeded.

**TRIED FOR SMUGGLING.**  
Louis Rothansky, Deported From Canada, Who Defeated Bail, Pleads Not Guilty.  
Boston, April 29.—Louis Rothansky, of New York, arrested last week after deportation from Canada, pleaded not guilty today to two federal indictments charging conspiracy to smuggle drugs from Canada into the United States. The indictments were returned in September, 1916, and soon after that Rothansky was arrested in New York, but defaulted his bail. Federal officials located him recently when he was in Montreal, as a German spy suspect, and was obliged to reveal his identity in order to clear himself of the charge. He was held in \$7000 bonds for trial.

**GOLD STAMPEDE AT COAST.**  
Prince Rupert, April 29.—There is quite a flurry of excitement at Shuttie Island, Dawson Sound, Queen Charlotte Islands, over some new gold discoveries. Many men employed in the lumbering trades are quitting their positions to stake claims.

EXCHANGE PRISONERS  
OR YIELD PETROGRAD

Washington, April 29.—Germany has demanded of Russia an exchange of prisoners and threatened to take Petrograd unless the Russian Government agrees to the terms advanced, the state department here has learned. The German demand, as outlined, calls for the immediate release of all German prisoners who are in good health; that those who are ill shall remain in Russia under the care of neutral physicians, and that the Germans on their side will release only those Russian prisoners who are ill or are incapacitated.

**ENEMY AIRCRAFT OUT  
IN LARGE NUMBERS**  
With the British Army in France, April 29.—German airplanes were out in great numbers at dawn, flying low over the chain of hills behind Komel, attempting to attack British troops and transport trains on the roads, as is usual preliminary to a battle.

This morning's enemy stroke was delivered at Ypres, at the schepenberg Hill and to the west of Baillieu, in the direction of Hazebrouk.

After resting for two days in order to throw in fresh divisions and bring guns forward, the fourth army opened an intense bombardment at about three o'clock this morning. The infantry attack was launched two hours later.

**ATTEMPTED ATTACKS  
UPON HANGARD WOOD**  
Paris, April 29.—The war office reports: "During the night the Germans attempted several times to attack the French positions in Hangard Wood. Our fire checked all their efforts. There was great activity of the artillery on both sides between Villers-Bretonneux and the Luce River, and in the region between Lassigny and Noyon."

A German raid north of Grivernar was without result. French detachments penetrated the German lines in the vicinity of Corbeny, near Courcy, on the right bank of the Meuse and in upper Alsace, bringing back prisoners. There was very heavy artillery fighting at Poses Wood and Carpiennes Wood (Verdun front).

"On the remainder of the front the night passed in quiet."

**VICE-REGAL TOUR.**  
Chatham, April 29.—Lieut.-Col. H. G. Henderson, military secretary to His Excellency the Duke of Devonshire, in a letter to Mayor Charles Clements of this city, states that in the tour of western Ontario which Their Excellencies purpose making the latter part of this month, the vice-regal party will spend three hours in the city on May 31st for the purpose of visiting the hospitals, Red Cross rooms and kindred societies or other points of interest. The Duke and Duchess and the members of their party may be expected about three o'clock in the afternoon, Colonel Henderson states.

**THREE NEW ENEMY GUNS.**  
Amsterdam, April 29.—Three new long-range German guns, made at Dusseldorf for the bombardment of Paris, according to the correspondent at Maastricht of Les Nouvelles, passed thru Belgium last Friday in the direction of France.

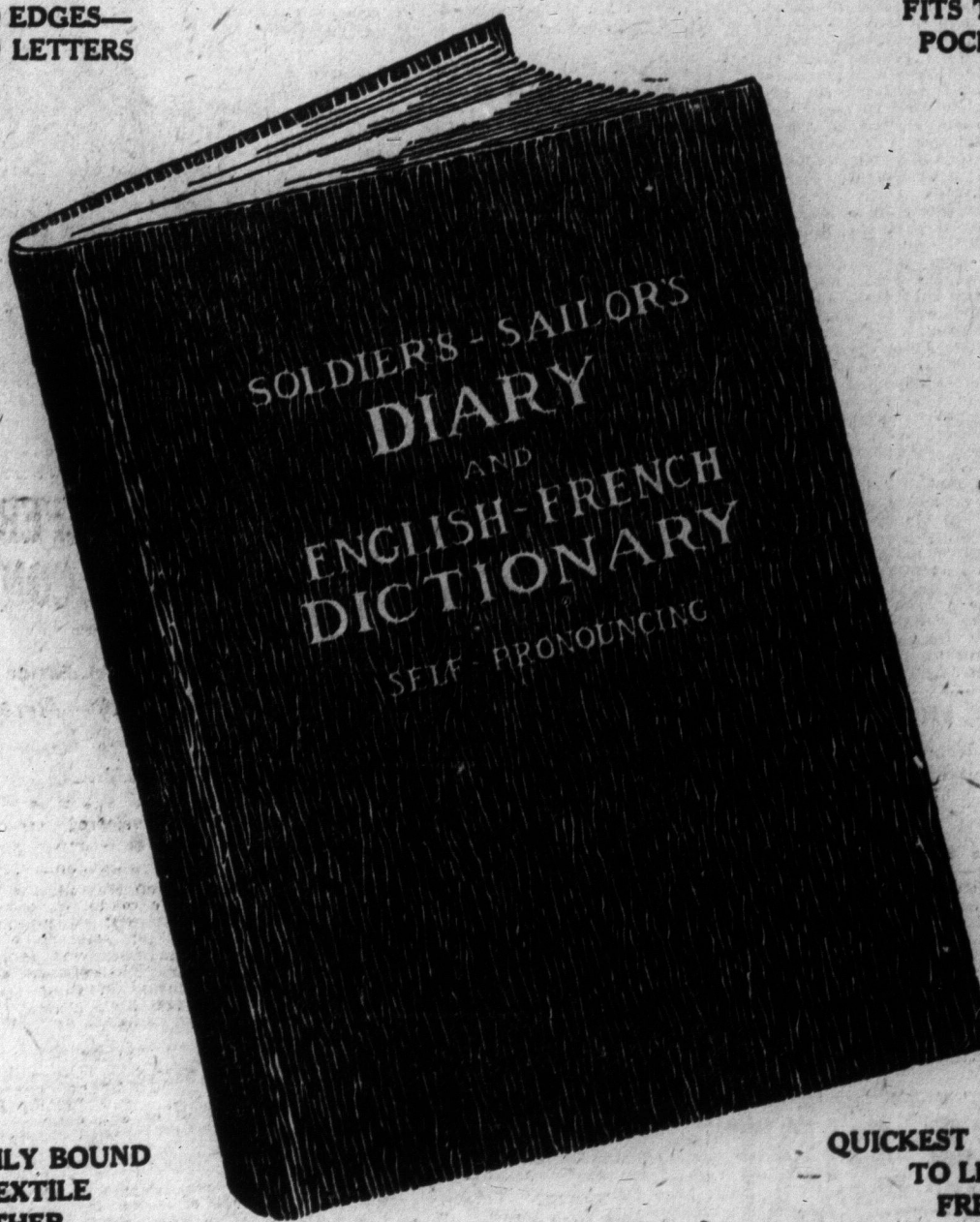

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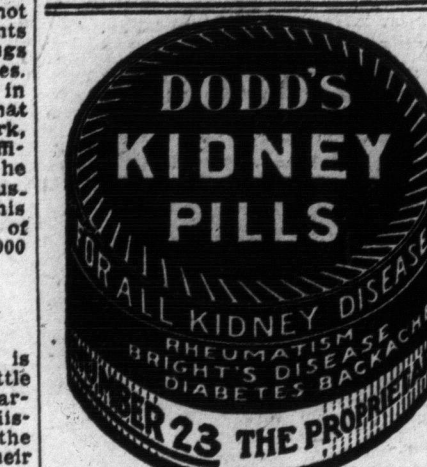
