BISHOP RIDLEY COLLEGE GAMES.

Senior and Junior Championships
Captured by F. W. Baldwin
and V. Nelson.

St. Catharines, May 26.—Bishop Ridley
College held its tenth annual games this
afternoon on the college cricket field, when
a large number of the friends of the college
witnessed some very keenly-contested
events.

F. W. Baldwin succeeded in winning the
George Gooderham senior championship cup
and medal, while V. Nelson carried off the
junior cup, presented by Mr. W. G. Good-
erham. Mr. H. Gander won the cup pre-
sented by the Ridley Old Boys' Association.

A feature of the day was Gander's mag-
nificent effort in the running broad jump,
when he cleared 20 feet 1 1/2 in., and estab-
lished a new college record for the event.

DRYDEN IS AGAIN SEATLESS.

Bribery Was Proved and the Defend-
ant's Counsel Threw Up
the Sponge.

FARMER GILMORE WANTED \$30,

But Finally Accepted \$15 From the
"Man Up Stairs" in the Gordon
House, Pickering.

Whitby, Ont., May 26.—The South On-
tario election was voided by Justices Ooster
and Rose and the trial brought to a con-
clusion this morning. Several cases of per-
sonal bribery by Hewitt, Morrish and Cap-
t. Sullivan in Pickering Township were
proven, and the respondent's counsel ad-
mitted agency.

A sample of the evidence is that of Wil-
liam Gilmore, a farmer in Pickering, who
admitted he saw Hewitt on Thursday before
the election, "coming out to the field where
I was working." Said Gilmore: "He asked
if I wouldn't vote for Mr. Dryden. I said
'I hadn't for some time.' He said he would
give me a decent day's pay for me and my
two boys. He told me to come to the Gor-
don House in Pickering village, where there
was a man upstairs who would pay me. He
showed me a man in the first room to the
right hand as you go up. The man said
he wasn't paying such money, as I asked
him for \$30, but he would give me \$15. I
took it. We voted. I didn't see Hewitt
again till to-day."

Hon. S. H. Blake, Q.C., then cross-ex-
amined witness as follows:

"Did you get any money from the other
side?"

"I ain't supposed to tell."

Justice Ooster: Witness, answer the ques-
tion.

Witness: I got \$5.

Hon. John Dryden, the respondent, at the
end of the several cases which were proven,
was examined by Mr. Blake as follows:

"I never heard of these men except Mr.
Titus until their names were mentioned in
the examination for discovery. I know of
no improper expenditure of money in the
election."

Their Lordships thereupon declared the
election void, with costs to the petitioner,
and reported the following names: William
Gilmore, Capt. John Sullivan, William
Stewart, Pat Sullivan, William McCormack,
Byron Linton, Simon Hewitt, William Mor-
rish and Ben Palmer.
