Great Strike of Textile Workers, Affecting 600 Firms, Inaugurated.

WAGE LOSS DAILY OF \$125,000

Mill Owners Say They Will Close for a Year If It is Necessary.

Philadelphia, June 1 .- A general trike of textile workers, involving 90,-000 operatives, was inaugurated here to-day. Of the 600 firms engaged in the textile industry here 47 have granted the demands of the union, and their plants, employing about 15,000 hands, plants, employing about 15,000 hands, are in operation. All of the sixty three ingrain carpet mills are idle, affecting directly 13,000 hands. All of the dyers, who are said to control the situation, are on strike, with the exception of those of the Berkshire mills. Thirtynine branches of the textile trade are affected by the strike and the interest. I got so weak

BUREAU PRINTERS AT WORK. Did Not Stand to Their Intention to

Ottawa, June 1. - (Globe Special.) -The printers at the Bureau are at work this morning, and appeared to have abandoned the idea of a strike. Such being the case, the question of converting the Bureau from a union into an open office will not arise. The government had contemplated the acceptance of the service of printers who did not hold union cards, providing a did not hold union cards, providing a strike had taken place, but the Bureau strike had taken place, but the Bureau iemployies appear ito have regarded discretion as the better part of valor, and hence the question of employing union or non-union men will not, it is thought, arise. The decision of the printers is, from the point of view of self-interest, an admirable one. Neither the government per parliaments are in the government nor parliament are in the temper to brook any dictation from the Ottawa Typographical Union, and it would not take much to bring about a determination to close the Bureau altogether, and have the printing done by cutside firms.
