ROCKEY.

LONDON WON EASILY.
Sarnia, Ont., Feb. 4.—London's hockey club, with between three and four hundred enthusiasts from the Forest City, swooped down on Sarnia last night and took the town by storm. The occasion was the championship game of hockey between the London and Sarnia clubs. A special train on the G. T. R. brought the visitors to town. They arrived here about 7:30 o'clock, and headed by a band, marched to St. Andrew's Rink. Prior to this, the Sarnia band, followed by a crowd of Sarnia young men, all attired in hard times' costume, paraded Front street and then to the rink. Assembled there the opposing forces marched around on the ice and furnished amusement for the 1,000 spectators. Shortly before 9 o'clock the players took their places on the ice. Referee Gauthier blew his whistle and the game was on. The match was a lively one from start to finish, being keenly contested by every individual player. In the first half London scored four goals to Sarnia's nothing. This was not the result of poor play by the home team by any means, but was purely owing to the visitors being better goal shooters when the rubber came within range of the goal posts. In this half Ewing and Gilmour each shot two goals. In the second half Sarnia took a turn at putting the puck between the posts, and before time was called had succeeded in shooting four goals. These were interspersed with

KILLED WHILE COUPLING CARS

Grand Trunk Brakeman Crushed to Death.

Rev. J. W. Pring, of Port Lambton, Seriously Injured—Man Thrown From a Load and Killed.

Lindsay, Ont., Feb. 4.—W. Higgs, aged 21 years, Grand Trunk brakeman here for the past two or three years, was killed yesterday afternoon while coupling cars. The accident was not witnessed by anyone, but it is supposed that Higgs slipped while coupling the engine to a freight car, and the tender passed over his body. Death was instantaneous. Higgs was unmarried.

A MINISTER SERIOUSLY HURT.

Port Lambton, Feb. 4.—On Wednesday evening a serious accident happened Rev. J. W. Pring, of this place. He was holding a series of revival services at Brown's Church, assisted by Evangelist Brownlow, of Toronto. Before going to the church after tea, Mr. Pring went to the barn to feed his horse, and when putting down hay from the mow, stepped in a hole, and fell to the floor beneath, sustaining serious injuries, breaking his collar-bone and receiving bruises about the head. The reverend gentleman was rendered unconscious for two hours after the accident. A physician found that the unfortunate gentleman was suffering from concussion of the brain, and he is in a critical condition.

KILLED BY HIS HORSES.

Hamilton, Ont., Feb. 4.—Wm. Webb, only son of Thomas Webb, a farmer living near Eldon, was thrown from a load of wood which he was bringing to Hamilton, by his horses bolting, and was instantly killed.

SMALLPOX SPREADING.

Toronto, Feb. 4.—Dr. Bryce, secretary of the provincial board of health, has heard from Warren's Point, Ontario, that a case of smallpox had appeared among the workmen engaged on the canal. A receiving house has been opened at East Hawkesbury township also that two more cases have appeared in the house of the reeve, where the first outbreak occurred.

From Irish Creek, Grenville county, where a previous case was reported, a receiving house has been opened in the development of two other cases in the Brown House, where the young man died last Saturday.

BLAZE AT BARRIE.

Barrie, Feb. 4.—This town was visited yesterday by a disastrous fire, which commenced in Vain & Co.'s dry-goods store, and spread to Mrs. McNeil's living apartments, a store recently occupied by Frawley & Devlin, J. F. Jackson's photo gallery, and W. A. Pae's dry-goods store, and on the other side to Steven's clothing store, James Vain's grocery, and E. Williams' stores and living rooms. The block of six stores was owned by W. A. Pae, Thomas Johnson, Geo. Plaxton, R. O. Oxenham, J. S. Johnson and Robt. King, sen., whose losses are about \$500, \$1,500, \$27,000, \$2,000 and \$500 respectively. The merchants who lost are: W. A. Pae, \$1,000; J. F. Jackson, \$400; Vain & Co., \$15,000; R. A. Stephens, \$3,000; James Vain, \$4,000; E. P. Williams, \$1,500; Mrs. McNeil, \$300.

STRIKERS WANT GOLD.

Colon, Feb. 4.—At Panama the steamship strikers, who were engaged by the month, petitioned the governor to enforce the payment of their wages up to the date of the beginning of the strike, these having been held on the plea of breach of contract. A conference was held at the governor's palace, attended by agents of the steamship company and the Panama Railroad, and it was agreed to increase the wages 25 cents in silver per day, as well as to make the payment of arrears asked for in the petition. Nevertheless, the strike continues, the strikers demanding a dollar in gold. The British consul at Colon, it is reported, has cabled the governor-in-chief and captain-general of Jamaica, Sir August Hemming, requesting that a British man-of-war be dispatched to Colon to protect British subjects and property there.

"WHY DID YOU HIT ME?"

Reason Restored After Twelve Years to a Chicago Man.

A Resident of York Mills Has Not Awakened Since Saturday.

Chicago, Feb. 4.—Twelve years ago Charles Burrell was struck on the head with a brick. Since then, until Thursday, he had been insane, and for a number of years he was an inmate of the Eastern Illinois asylum at Kankakee. Wednesday Dr. W. G. Stearns, at the asylum, aided by the X rays, operated on Burrell's skull. Now the cloud which had so long obscured the light of Burrell's mind has passed away, and he began life where he left off twelve years ago.

When but a boy young Burrell had a quarrel with a playmate, who threw a brick at him. He was dazed by the blow, and never recovered from its effects until the operation. Dr. Stearns put the young man in a chair. With the X ray a skiagraph of the skull was taken. This showed a thickening of the bone near the top of the skull on the left side. This was removed in the usual manner, the foreign matter excised, and the patient was put to bed. He awoke Thursday entirely rational, and his first words were: "Why did you hit me?"

Hamilton, Feb. 4.—Mr. William Enright, one of the very old residents of York Mills, who kept a small store nearly opposite the postoffice for many years, has been in a state of somnolence since the end of last week. He has not been in good health for some time, and since Saturday has lain in a sound sleep. It is thought by the doctors that he will probably pass away in his present condition.

GIFTS TOTAL \$2,650,000.

Montreal, Feb. 3.—Sir William Macdonald has forwarded to the treasurer of McGill University a check for \$181,250, to make up the estimated amount necessary to endow the Macdonald building of chemistry and mining. This will make his total benefaction for this building alone \$350,000, and will bring up the gifts of Sir William Macdonald to the university to something like \$2,650,000.

LOSS \$500,000 TO \$800,000.

Philadelphia, Pa., Feb. 3.—A fire, which originated in the big cracker bakery of the Stewart Cracker Company, at Thirteenth and Hamilton streets, at 4 o'clock this morning, completely gutted that structure, and thousands of dollars' worth of the adjoining property was destroyed, the total loss being estimated at from \$500,000 to \$800,000. The block in which the fire occurred is occupied entirely by manufacturing establishments.

THE GROWING TIME.

Windsor, Feb. 4.—County Clerk Marcon's list of chattel mortgages filled with him by Essex farmers during the last year, shows that 339 were given, aggregating \$106,298. In 1897, 352 mortgages were filed, their equivalent in cash being \$118,284. The decrease in the cash value of the mortgages was \$12,086. "This," said the clerk, "is surely a sign of increasing prosperity among the farmers of this country."

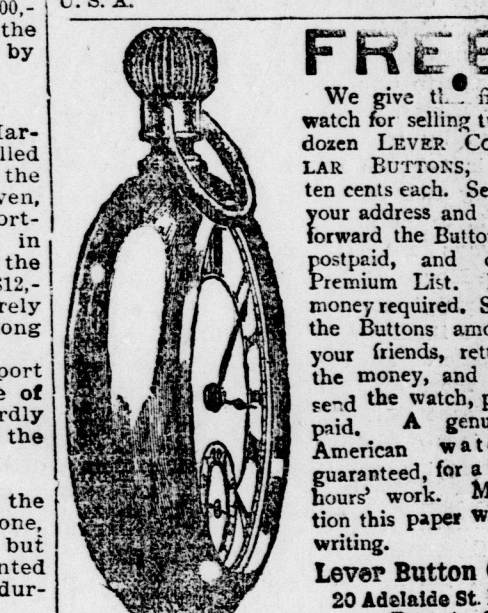
Toronto wholesalers generally report paper well met this month. Some of the houses report payments as hardly up to expectations, though good on the whole.
