RITUALISM

Case of a Clergyman Who Heard a Boy's Confession.

London, March 27.—The debate in the House of Lords Thursday concerned itself with a case that is likely to have a great effect in the present crisis of the Church of England regarding the alleged Romanizing tendency of the Ritualists. The fiercest attack made by the Protestant party is that upon the practice of compulsory confession, said to have been introduced by the Ritualists. The particular case under notice is that of a boy of 16 named Cavalier, who formed the acquaintance of an unbeneficed clergyman named Bridge. The clergyman heard the lad's confession, and then gave him a Roman Catholic book of devotion, written by Cardinal Manning. Subsequently Cavalier left home, and went first to a Ritualist clergyman at Derby and then to a species of monastery, the House of the Sacred Mission, at Milldenhall.

The Bishop of London defended Bridge on the ground that he gave the book without having read it. Lord Halsbury, however, strenuously and without qualification, defended the whole action, but popular opinion is overwhelmingly condemnatory, for the English public almost universally is jealous of priestly interference with the children. It is generally believed among Protestants of moderate views that confession is the most threatening of all the Ritualistic practices complained of by the evangelical party. Even many persons of the High Church party are beginning to see that if they wish to prevent disestablishment they must resist the growing tendency in the direction of compulsory confession.

BEER IN TABLETS.

London, March 27.—The latest German scientific invention reported here is a "beer tablet." The beverage is reduced to a powder, the addition of water to which, by the generation of carbonic acid gas, makes a foaming tankard, as good as if freshly drawn from the barrel. Many pints can thus be carried in the waistcoat pocket.

DREADFUL DROUGHT

In New South Wales—Stock Dead and Dying in All Directions.

Vancouver, B. C., March 27.—Australia is prostrated by another heat wave. H. C. Russell, the government astronomer, says that there will be no rain until the end of March or April. If this proves true immense pastures and ranging lands will wither up, causing widespread ruin. One correspondent in the Sydney Mail says that a million sheep and hundreds of thousands of horses and cattle are dead from the drought. Settlers are on the verge of bankruptcy. The correspondent says:

"Already the grass has vanished and the tanks, creeks and rivers are dry. I have witnessed some heartbreaking scenes in the struggle of flocks to save their stock. I saw men who had been working for 20 years to get their homes in paying shape, left without a sheep or blade of grass and their homes destroyed eventually by bush fires. The black visitation is a national calamity, and the drought has brought all the horrors of a plague with it. Thousands are living without meat and in a half-starved state, cattle and sheep being all gone or reduced to skin and bone only. Members of parliament are traveling through the affected districts, and each colony will cancel the rent for public lands altogether or reduce it to a nominal sum."

W. N. Willis, of New South Wales, after a trip through the affected districts, says that 50 per cent of the stock has succumbed to drought. Mr. Russell admits that the colony is in a dreadful condition, but says that the appalling loss of sheep is due to overstocking as much as to the terrible drought.

SEVERE SNOWSTORM.

Gaylord, Mich., March 27.—The worst blizzard of the season, prevailed here Saturday. Much snow has fallen, and all trains are delayed.

Bloody Battle Fought Sunday

Between Filipinos and the U. S. Forces.

Insurgents Driven Out of Malabon and Malinta Captured.

The Americans Lose 27 Killed and 142 Wounded—The 'Pinos Make a Stout Resistance.

Manila, March 27—8:10 a.m.—The Filipinos are burning their stronghold at Malabon, and their forces are fleeing from the city in the direction of Malolos. Gen. MacArthur's division is pushing toward Malabon. The insurgents will probably make their last stand at Malolos. Insurgent papers, received here from Malolos, show that Aguinaldo is endeavoring to deceive his followers into the belief that they are winning great victories. All the recent engagements are proclaimed as American defeats. The papers describe the insurgents meeting with the American forces at various points, and end their accounts with the assertion that the Americans retired to their original lines, suffering great slaughter.

Washington, March 27.—The war department said tonight made public the following dispatch from Gen. Otis at Manila:

"Perfectly northern movement not yet completed. Otis' and Hale's brigades, with mounted troops met heavy resistance, and carried last night six miles east of Polo, and six miles north of the line from which the advance was taken up. Wheaton's brigade at Calocan drove the enemy one and a half miles north across river. Hall, on the extreme right, encountered a considerable force and routed it.

TWO HUNDRED 'PINOS KILLED. "Fighting heavy near Calocan. Movement continues in the morning. Our casualties about 160, 25 killed. Enemy lost in killed alone 200."

FILIPINOS FIRE AND RUN. Manila, March 26—8:15 a.m.—Twenty-six dead and 150 wounded in a hospital is the latest statement of the American losses in the engagement with the Filipinos. Yesterday's fighting furnished a specimen of the difficulties with which the Americans have to contend. The Filipinos, except opposite Malabon, permitted their opponents to fight several hundred yards of them. They would fire a few volleys from their cover and then scuttle back to another cover, repeating these tactics while the Americans fighting a hidden foe.

SUFFERED GREATER LOSS. In proportion, than did the enemy. A larger percentage of the enemy's wounded died than of the Americans, many of them perishing from neglect. The gunboat Helena and two army gunboats commanded Malabon, but the authorities desire to avoid smashing the town, where there is much valuable property belonging to foreigners, and where are located warehouses of most of the Manila firms.

FIGHTING CONTINUED ALL DAY SUNDAY. The United States troops, under Brig. Gen. Lloyd Wheaton, captured the town of Malinta, beyond the Tullahan River, on Sunday after a short fight. Col. Harry C. Egbert, of the Twenty-second Regular Infantry, was killed. Prince Loewenstein, formerly aide-de-camp on the staff of Brig. Gen. Miller at Iloilo, got in front of the firing line and was shot in the side, dying almost instantly. A German, who accompanied the United States troops, was killed. Casualties on Sunday were much lighter than those of Saturday, the total losses thus far reported since the engagement being 45 killed and 145 wounded. Gen. Wheaton entered Malinta, which is a small village of huts, at 1 o'clock in the afternoon. The United States gunboat Helena and other gunboats bombarded Malabon, about a mile northwest of Calocan, for several hours. The insurgents made a fierce resistance to the American advance up the railway at Malinta. In addition to the fatal wounding of Col. Egbert, several men of the Twenty-second Infantry and several men of the Oregon and Kansas regiments were killed.

MALABON FIRED. Evidently anticipating a bombardment by the fleet, 1,000 rebels vacated Malabon at night, leaving a few to burn the town.

Gen. Wheaton's brigade stretched out along the railroad from Calocan to the Tullahan River, was powerless to prevent the withdrawal of 'Pinos from Malabon, owing to the natural obstacles and to the strong opposition. A column of smoke at daybreak was the first report of the enemy's intentions. The flames of the burning rice mills and large buildings could be plainly seen from Calocan, and by 11 o'clock in the morning the only building of importance not destroyed in the center of the town was a large stone church. Many of the rebels sought refuge in the suburbs of Navotas and Casag, or were driven inland by the shells of the Helena, Callao, Ningdapan and Laguna de Bay.

NO EASY TASK. In the meantime, Gen. Wheaton's brigade occupied the railway to the river, but was unable to repair the bridge, which had been destroyed by the enemy, or to advance, owing to the opposition and the hills on the other side. The calculations of both Gen. Hale and Gen. Otis, whose brigades constituted Gen. MacArthur's division, were much

test they have. Six regiments of infantry and artillery, comprising approximately 8,000 men, one regiment of which has sailed from San Francisco, are under orders for Manila. The arrival of the transport Sheridan with 1,900 reinforcements is hourly expected at Manila.

IN THE TRENCHES OF THE ENEMY

Americans Advance on the Filipinos All Along the Line.

Hot Day's Work—U. S. Troops In the Enemy's Trenches—Half the Town of Paranaque Destroyed.

Manila, March 27—7:40 a.m.—The Americans have advanced along the line of the Dagupan Railroad, driving the Filipinos from Malinta and Gucayan, where there were 3,000 inhabitants. Last night the brigades of Gens. Harrison, Gray, Otis and Hale encamped in the enemy's trenches at Maycauyan and that of Gen. Wheaton at Malinta. Gen. Wheaton's brigade formed a junction with the remainder of Gen. MacArthur's division at Malinta; and the latter, leaving Gen. Wheaton there, marched along the railroad to Maycauyan. This place was fortified, and for 300 yards from it there were trenches on each side of the track. These were taken possession of by the American troops. The movements of the Americans will be pushed in this direction.

HOT DAY'S WORK. The day's work of the United States troops consisted of storming the successive trenches. The Filipinos occupying them were completely hidden. The enemy poured a strong fire from every trench until they were dislodged by a flanking volley, when they would disappear into the woods. The fighting only to make a stand at the next line. The American loss was remarkably small, 7 being reported killed and 24 wounded. It is known that the Filipinos were so protected that they suffered little. No dead insurgents were found in the trenches. Forty prisoners were taken by the Americans, and it is estimated that the rebel casualties numbered 20. The insurgents broke their guns when compelled to abandon them.

GUNBOATS ENGAGED. The Helena and the army gunboats shelled Malabon and the country beyond, while the Monadnock focussed all its batteries upon Paranaque for two hours, for the purpose of destroying the military stores there. A great smoke was caused, but the insurgents are in possession of the town, the results of the shelling are not obtainable.

The evacuation of Malabon was a picturesque rout, thousands of men, women and children, loaded down with household goods, some with their dearest treasures, fighting cocks, under their arms, poured across the swamps in the early morning.

An exploded caisson at the railroad bridge proved a bar to the Americans. Ten soldiers of the Oregon Regiment, while searching for two of those killed early in the fighting, sneaked into the city in the morning and found the place in a condition of panic. The insurgents seeing they fled in a panic, thinking the American forces were in possession. The Oregonians shot several armed natives, and then returned to camp.

The American forces did not occupy Malabon, but are concentrating their strength to strike Malolos. Malabon is

A CITY OF DESOLATION. The American soldiers have been forbidden to enter the place for fear that natives may be lurking there.

Y., March 27.—One of the passengers on the Campana, which sailed for England on Saturday, was William Fox, of this city, who goes there to take possession of a one-tenth interest in an estate valued at nearly \$250,000. He has already received \$1,000 on account. Fox, who is an expert horseman, came to this country twenty years ago.
