THE CITY DADDIES ARE LONGING TO TAKE IN THE LONG JAUNTS

Could Not Agree as to Who Shall Get Plums, and Matter Is Life to the Mayor.

City daddies, in council assembled, last night very nearly quarreled over the all-important matter of who should secure the jaunting plums of the year. In the end, the aldermen failing to agree, unloaded the problem on to the mayor, and it now devolves upon his worship, who shall and who shall not take in the trips to various places which are scheduled for this year.

They include three jaunts: The Union of Canadian Municipalities meets at Port Arthur the middle of August. The firemen's convention meets in Washington, D. C., in October. And the Ontario Municipal Union meets in Toronto during August.

A Pleasant Task. The question of appointing delegates to the conventions made Ald. Garratt smack his lips. Ald. Matthews, with an ache in his anatomy since he was turned down a year ago, when he wanted to go to Dallas, was hungry on this occasion.

Ald. Garratt appeared to have met his wishes entirely when he moved the following resolution, which provided for a jaunt for everybody in the council.

Delegates to Port Arthur—Mayor Judd, Ald. Stevely, Beattie and Matthews.

Delegates to Washington—Ald. Garratt, Gillen, Booth and Fire Chief Clark.

Delegates to Toronto—Ald. Cooper, Saunders, Gerry, Scarlett, Rose, Stevenson and Assessment Commissioner Grant.

Thought It Was Easy. Ald. Garratt looked complacent, and termed the list a "slate." But there were rough roads ahead of the "slate." Jealousy prompted some aldermen to attack it. Others were actuated by a feeling that it meant the spending of too much money.

Ald. Cooper objected to the young aldermen getting all the long trips. Moreover, he thought it was not right to send any more than two men to Port Arthur. It would cost \$300 to send four delegates, he said. Ald. Cooper also accused his brother aldermen of having hatched the list presented two weeks ago. He moved in amendment that only Mayor Judd and Ald. Gerry go to Port Arthur. Ald. Stevenson seconded.

Ald. Matthews Reminiscent. Ald. Matthews recalled the fact that he had failed to get a "look in" on the long trips last year. He accused Ald. Stevenson of having done pretty well for a young alderman last year, when he went to Halifax as a delegate from the council.

DR. NIVEN WAS GIVEN THE PLUM

Chosen Chairman of the Board of Health Yesterday Afternoon.

Dr. J. S. Niven was yesterday chosen chairman of the board of health, to succeed Dr. English, who now resides in Hamilton.

There was a little flurry before Dr. Niven took his seat.

Mr. Charles Taylor moved that Dr. Niven be chairman, and Mr. Harry Clark moved that the honor be conferred upon Ald. W. J. Stevenson.

Mr. Clark said that with all due respect to Dr. Niven, Ald. Stevenson had been a member of the board for a number of years, and Dr. Niven was only a new member. He thought Dr. Stevenson was entitled to the chairmanship.

Dr. Niven interrupted to say that he had been a member of the board of health 25 years ago.

Mr. Wm. Skinner said he thought Dr. Stevenson was entitled to the chairmanship.

Dr. Stevenson Refuses. "I positively refuse to accept the chairmanship unless the board is unanimous," declared Ald. Stevenson.

"I guess you had better drop out, then," Mayor Judd replied. "There doesn't appear to be any chance of unanimity here."

"Well, that's my position," Ald. Stevenson said. "If there's to be any opposition, I withdraw my name."

"I hear you don't want the chairmanship, on my casting vote?" queried his worship.

"And you said things about me in the papers," Ald. Stevenson returned.

"I've tossed a penny for the chairmanship, and lost it," said ex-Ald. Carrothers.

Mr. Taylor again moved that Dr. Niven take the chair, and there was no opposition, the doctor presided at the meeting. He asked for the unanimous support of all members of the board, stating that unless all worked with him he could not carry on properly the work of the board.

Attending Smallpox Patients. Ald. Stevenson brought up the matter of the attending of smallpox patients by the M. H. O. He said the question is one which is getting the board into trouble, and some distinct understanding should be arrived at.

Mr. Carrothers stated that during his term the board had decided that Dr. Hutchinson should attend all smallpox cases, as a part of his official duties. He declared that if such a clause does not appear in the minutes it should be there.

It was stated that the health act will not permit the M. H. O. to attend smallpox cases.

Ald. Gillen withdrew his name from the list presented by Ald. Garratt to go to Washington, and asked that Ald. Saunders' name be substituted.

Ald. Stevely said he was willing to vote for Ald. Gerry instead of himself to go to Port Arthur, if he wanted to go.

Ald. Gerry declared he was not particular. If the council wanted him to go he would go.

Opposed Jaunts. Ald. Gillen vigorously opposed the spending of so much money in jaunts. It would mean one-tenth of a mill on the tax rate, he said. The Port Arthur trip alone would cost over \$300.

"No, it won't," said the mayor.

"How much did the Halifax trip cost last year?" queried Ald. Gillen.

"About \$200," replied his worship.

"Well, I have not been on one of these trips as yet, and I will not go on one now," Ald. Gillen replied. "I don't think it's right to spend the people's money in that way."

Ald. Stevenson gave the mayor a savage stab when he stated that his worship had started in by cutting out of the board of health deputation to Ottawa, but was silent now.

For himself, he declared he would take part in no deputation. He felt the number of delegates proposed to send to the different places were altogether too large.

Only Fire Chief Should Go. Ald. Gillen asserted that only the fire chief should go to Washington. As to Port Arthur, the mayor should go, and if he wanted company an alderman should accompany him.

Ald. Matthews said there are very few aldermen who do not believe the aldermen should be paid for the services they render the city.

And as the law does not permit of salaries being paid, there are very few people who do not believe that the aldermen are entitled to a trip occasionally.

The water commissioners, with their officers, attend conventions all over America, and nothing is said of it. But if an alderman takes a trip the fact is heralded with a view to his detriment.

But he did not believe that such reports hurt an alderman with the people. He favored the sending of a deputation to Port Arthur.

Up to the Mayor. Ald. Matthews also accused Ald. Gillen of being paltry in talking as he did in regard to deputations.

The vote was then taken on the proposal to send only the mayor and Ald. Gerry to Port Arthur, and it was defeated.

Ald. Saunders moved that the mayor, Ald. Gerry and Ald. Matthews go to Port Arthur. The motion was lost.

Ald. Stevely moved that the matter of sending delegates to Port Arthur and the other places be left to the mayor with power.

The mayor didn't like the idea, but it went to a vote, and was carried.

IF MISS CORELLI WOULD MARRY

Here's a Description of the Angelic Creature She Would Choose.

London, July 2.—Laudably anxious to provide a novel topic, an English journal treats its readers this week to a daring speculation on the kind of husband that would best suit Marie Corelli.

"There is no doubt," says the writer of the article, but that consciously or unconsciously, an authoress strives more or less to invest her heroines with those mental, moral and physical attributes which reflect her own in idealized form, and represent what she deems most desirable, and hence would fair possess. In similar fashion she draws her hero in the likeness of the particular man whose image happens to dominate her life at the moment. As the same woman throughout—for in each successive illusion she eagerly seeks the bitter, sweet rapture of her first love—it is not difficult to deduce a manner of man who alone can capture her imagination, and from that stronghold carry her heart by storm."

By this method of deduction the heroes of Marie's fictions are made to furnish this composite picture of the man whom she might consent to annex.

"The husband for Marie Corelli must be of the heroic type, gentle, though firm; tender, yet strong. In appearance he must be handsome, for the writer of many exquisite, descriptive lines is sensitive to impressions of beauty, and in addition, he requires to be tall, dressed and distinguished, a man whom other women would covet."

"To make her happy he must possess an exalted belief in women, not in woman-kind in general, be it well understood, but in one woman in particular—Marie Corelli. Before winning his way to this implicit faith, and unwavering devotion, he must have waded deeply through the quagmire of doubt and the slough of despond. He must have suffered disillusionment at the hands of women of a more human and therefore less lofty type. She would fain be told of it in passionate periods delivered metaphorically speaking, from the center of the stage, in full view of the footlights; before a crowded and admiring audience."

What profession should this materialization of various ideals belong to? "His desirability as a husband," says the writer, "would be greatly en-

hanced should he happen to be un-fettered by the chains of any special however, his chief claim to distinction, while the exact amount of his income should not be clearly defined. Preferably, it should flow—freely, of course—from some mysterious source.

"The world at large should know him as an elegant dilettante. Friends should recognize in him a painter who could paint, and paint well, did he so choose. They should otherwise suspect him of being a poet, the author of certain exquisite verses, which appeared anonymously, while knowing him to be a composer whose musical conceptions were of too rare an order to be semiquavers. In the eyes of the vulgar, tion should lie in the fact that he was Marie Corelli's husband. So much from outside opinion.

"To Marie Corelli he should be all in all. Never should he weary of offering up incense at her shrine. In return, she and she alone, would recognize the genius which could accomplish all things he clearly defined, which was content to the fallen, a mine of boundless wealth, the resources of which he would not strive to ascertain for fear lest, in so doing, he might shake one petal from the roses which made fragrant the pleasantries wherein his lady delighted to wander, well knowing, but careless of the treasures beneath her worshiped feet."

Poor Marie! So shy and retiring, so adverse to publicity of all kinds that

she will bring a lawsuit against a photographer at the risk of getting columns printed about the case, and yet the phillistines of the press will not leave her alone. But Marie Corelli married! Somehow it is unthinkable.
