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THOMAS H. SMALLMAN DIES OF PNEUMONIA AFTER SHORT ILLNESS

Widely-Known Businessman Had Lived in London for Sixty Years and Was Connected With Many Big Enterprises.

Thomas H. Smallman, one of the most prominent, and in point of citizenship one of the oldest residents of the city, died at his home, Waverley, late yesterday afternoon from pneumonia. Mr. Smallman was taken ill on Sunday last, and his death had been momentarily expected. He was 73 years old.

Coming to this city when a boy in his teens, Mr. Smallman had been associated with a score of successful business and social enterprises. His life was an example of energy and determination which won for him the reputation of being one of the business leaders of the province. Beginning his career in the operating office of the London and Port Stanley Railway, he subsequently became a director of that road. He was born at Birr, Ireland, in 1825, and came to this country with his parents.

Saw the Opportunity. Mr. Smallman was one who, upon his arrival in Canada, recognized the unlimited wealth and the boundless opportunities of the country. He became interested in the Petrolia oil fields, in which connection he was appointed director of the Standard and the Imperial Oil Companies at their foundation. He was also associated with a number of other institutions of national standing.

A staunch Conservative, Mr. Smallman was for a number of years the honorary president of the Conservative Association. His business affiliations included the vice-presidency of the London and Western Trusts Company, and directorships on the Standard Oil Company, the Imperial Oil Company, the London Street Railway, the Ontario Loan and Debenture Company, the Canadian Theatres, Limited, the Oil Producing and Refining Company, and the Canada Chemical Company.

Interested in Sports. For several years he was president of the London Hunt and Country Club, at all times having taken a keen interest in its sports. He was also a member of the Western Fair Board and a life-long member of the London Club.

Four years ago Mr. Smallman was stricken with pneumonia, and his recovery was considered remarkable at the time owing to his age.

Three weeks previous to his death his daughter, Mrs. (Col.) C. K. Morgan, wife of Col. Morgan, C.M.B., chief medical officer of the British recruiting mission of the United States, visited him from England after an absence from this city of several years.

In addition to his daughter he is survived by one son, Capt. J. B. Smallman, conservation officer for Military District No. 1. J. B. Smallman, the founder of the firm of Smallman & Ingram, this city, who died about two years ago, was a brother. James Smallman of San Francisco is also a brother.

Patriotic Citizen. In the death of Mr. Smallman London loses one of its most highly esteemed and patriotic citizens. Extremely sociable and of a kindly disposition, he will be missed by a host not only of the province, but throughout the continent.

His wife, who was a devoted and dependable Mrs. Smallman will be greatly missed, as was the remark of Sir George Gibbons to the Advertiser: "London loses one of her most faithful and finest citizens. I, for one, regret his death deeply."

The funeral will be held from his late residence, Waverley, on Grand avenue.

HUNS LOST RESPECT OF ALL BY FIRING ON THE RED CROSS

Germans Dishonored Sign of Humanity.

A charming musicale, arranged by Mrs. Kennedy and Mrs. E. A. Gibson, Tuesday evening, on the behalf of the patriotic work of the Sisters of the Soldiers of Crown Memorial Church, was made the occasion for presenting one of the valued members, Mrs. Whetter, with a life membership in the Red Cross. Making the presentation address, Rev. G. G. Warner touched upon the history of the international organization, the Red Cross Society, instituted for service to the suffering and wounded in war-time, for relief work in peace-time.

"One nation may fire on the flag of another nation, and still be patriotic, and hold the respect of other nations," he said, "but no nation can fire on the Red Cross and still hold claim to respect." drawing attention to the charges laid at the door of Germany in this war in dishonoring the sign of the Red Cross. With regard to the organization of the Sisters of the Soldiers in his own church, Mr. Warner declared that because of the nature of the work of the Red Cross and its connection to the service of humanity, the church seems to be its most fitting environment.

After emphasizing the honor which membership in the Red Cross confers, the speaker stated that the Sisters of the Soldiers, in presenting a life membership to Mrs. Whetter were doing so in recognition of her services to the society, and also as a mark of appreciation of the fact that she had given to the war that which was more precious to her than time, money, effort or any material thing. Mrs. Leonard made the presentation of the life membership pin and certificate. Mrs. Whetter in a few words expressed her thanks.

The musical program, of exceptional merit, included solos by Mrs. Blackwell, Miss Minnie Fox, Sergts. McVeigh, Crystal and West presented. Douglas Westman; piano numbers by Miss Margaret Coleman, and cello numbers by Rev. G. G. Warner. Miss Minnie Raymond and Mr. Wheeler were the accompanists. Refreshments were served by the hostess after the program.
