

# PORTO RICO APPEALS FOR AID AFTER QUAKE

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—With more than 100 persons dead and thousands without shelter, food or clothing, as a result of the earthquake which shook the entire island last Friday, the Government of Porto Rico today appealed to Congress and to the Amer-

ican Red Cross for assistance, in cablegrams received here and forwarded to Washington.

## TEN MORE DEATHS FROM THE EPIDEMIC, BRANTFORD'S REPORT

Nearly One Hundred Cases in the Emergency Hospital.

500 SICK AT SARNIA

BRANTFORD, Oct. 17.—There were ten deaths reported here today from the Spanish influenza, and the situation was said to be lacking. Brantford men are reported tonight to be in critical condition, developing pneumonia as a result of the influenza.

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## ASKS CHEESE MAKERS FOR 2 WEEKS' EXTRA WORK THIS AUTUMN

Chief Dairy Instructor Makes Appeal to Farmers for Increase in Product.

KINGSTON, Oct. 17.—C. G. Pablo, chief dairy instructor for Eastern Ontario, is appealing to the cheese-making factories to remain open a week or two longer than usual this fall in order that the usual output may be realized.

In an address to the Frontenac Cheese Board today he pointed out that there was a shortage of about seventy thousand boxes at Montreal, compared with a year ago. He stated that one or two weeks' additional output in Eastern Ontario would wipe out the deficit, and as cheese was very much needed at the front, he appealed to the farmers to do their best.

## YOUTH ATTEMPTS TO SLAY TISZA, FORMER HUNGARIAN PREMIER

Amsterdam, Oct. 17.—As Count Stephen Tisza, the former Hungarian premier, was leaving the Lower House of Parliament at Budapest on Wednesday a youth approached his motor car with a revolver, according to a dispatch received from the Hungarian capital. Count Tisza's chauffeur struck the would-be assassin down before he was able to fire.

Count Tisza's assailant was arrested. He gave his name as Leitner and said he was 21 years of age and an official in the food department. He said he intended to attack Admiral Paul von Hintze, whose resignation as German secretary for foreign affairs had been reported during his visit to Budapest, but Admiral von Hintze had left before he was able to accomplish his purpose.

## Duke of Connaught Second Choice as Ruler of Bohemia

Majority of Delegates at Conference Favor a Monarchy.

BASEL, Oct. 17.—At a meeting of delegates held at Budapest recently, Deputy Daszynski, a Pole, openly announced that he was in favor of the establishment of a Bohemian republic, with Prof. Ernst Deutsch of Paris as president, according to the Associated Press. The majority, however, favored a monarchy, headed by Prince Maximilian of Hohenberg, son of Archduke Francis Ferdinand, whose assassination at Sarajevo in June, 1914, gave rise to the ultimatum to Serbia, which resulted in the outbreak of the war. It is said that the Duke of Connaught was the second choice.

SPREADS AT TILSONBURG. TILSONBURG, Oct. 17.—A special meeting of the board of health was held in the council chamber to consider steps to guard against an epidemic of influenza. Dr. J. H. Hoover, M.O.H., and Mayor Dean were strongly in favor of closing all churches, theatres and places of amusement until such a time as the board deemed it advisable to reopen the same, but other members of the board threw cold water on the suggestion, and warnings were published in local papers regarding the proper precautions. Public opinion is growing very strong that the local officials should take precautions, as has been done in surrounding towns. During the past three days the epidemic has spread very rapidly, and tonight one young lady died at the point of death with double pneumonia.

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## WILL ASK FOR BYLAW TO HOLD NOMINATIONS FOR OFFICE AT NIGHT

ST. THOMAS, Oct. 17.—The trades and labor council will demand that the city council pass a bylaw before the city council authorizing the holding of nominations for public office at night. In St. Thomas the situation is much different from some of the larger cities, for being a railroad centre, the large percentage of laboring men are unable to attend nominations when they are held as heretofore, in the morning between 11 and 12.

## NEW PRINCIPAL NAMED FOR WOODSTOCK COLLEGE

WOODSTOCK, Oct. 17.—Rev. Thomas Wearing, M.A., B.D., Ph.D., pastor of the First Baptist Church here for the last year and a half, has been appointed principal of Woodstock Baptist College to succeed A. T. MacNeil, who recently resigned the position to go into business for himself.

KOMOKA SOLDIER GASED. KOMOKA, Oct. 17.—Official word has been received by Wesley H. Eastman of Komoka that his second son, Pte. Charles Eastman, has been wounded and gassed in the recent fighting in France. This is the second son to be wounded. A younger brother was wounded last August and is now in England in a convalescent hospital. Both were wounded in the left thigh.

## Abdul Baha, "Prophet," Discovered by Britons

NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—The British Bureau of Information announced today the receipt of a cablegram from London saying that "British troops have discovered Abdul Baha at Haifa."

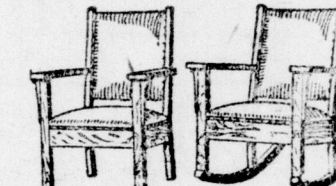

## CHAPLAIN OF TROOPS AT NIAGARA DIES OF SPANISH INFLUENZA

Capt. (Rev.) R. J. Cain Succumbs to Disease as Patient in Base Hospital.

TORONTO, Oct. 17.—Capt. Rev. Roy J. Cain, chaplain to the troops at Niagara camp since August last, died today from Spanish influenza at the base hospital, where he had been a patient for about a week. His wife was at the hospital when he died. His home was at Walkerton, but his last parish was at Thamesville.

Major A. L. Burch, acting assistant director of chaplains' services for eastern Canada, is ill with the influenza, as also are 35 other members of the staff at Toronto military district headquarters.
