Results of the Operations of the Military Service Act Will Be Made Public At An Early Date.

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—The results of the operations of the military service act will be made public at an early date, and will show that approximately 80,000 men have been actually secured and placed in khaki. ADMIRAL KOLCHAK TAKES COMMAND OF THE ALL-RUSSIAN ARMY AND FLEET

New Government Established At Omsk on November 18.

CHANGE WAS A SURPRISE

Move Was Due, It Is Claimed, To Danger Menacing the State.

Vladivostok, Nov. 19.—Through a coup on the part of the council of ministers of the new all-Russian Government at Omsk, Admiral Alex. Kolchak has become virtual dictator and commander of the all-Russian army and fleet. Two ministers, M. Avksentiev and M. Zenshenoff, who opposed Admiral Kolchak's dictatorship, have been arrested. The directors of the erstwhile Ufa government support Kolchak.

Telegrams received here from Omsk state that the move was "due to extraordinary circumstances and danger menacing the state." The council of ministers has assumed authority and transferred it to Admiral Kolchak. The latter has accepted the responsibility, and it is announced, has entered upon his duties as "supreme governor." Gen. Horvath, Gen. Ivanoff, minister of war of the Omsk Government, and Gen. Renoff, former commander of the all-Russian forces, announce that they recognize the new authority.

GERMAN FACTORIES REPORTED AS BUSY ON PEACE ORDERS

No Unemployment Reported as Result of Stopping of War Work.

Berlin, Nov. 17.—(By the Associated Press).—Most of the large industrial plants in and about Berlin already are working. No unemployment is reported as a result of the cessation of war industries work. Sigismund Bergmann, who has been in the city since the war, with Thomas A. Edison and to have been one of the founders of the General Electric Co. in the United States, but who is now one of the leading industrialists in Germany, said: "On the second day of the revolution we started to work on peace orders, of which we have enough booked to keep our sixty thousand employees busy for two years. This holds good for virtually every plant of any importance in Germany. The country has been literally working there, bare in all lines. Just as we have been turning our garments inside out we have helped ourselves along with a multitude of substitute devices in other directions."

PREMIER OF ITALY PAYS TRIBUTE TO THE ALLIED ARMIES

Prime Cause of Victory Due to Ideals That Actuated the Entente Troops.

Rome, Wednesday, Nov. 20.—Vittorio Orlando, Italian premier, speaking in the Chamber today, emphasized the history of the grandeur of the events of recent weeks, and the glories of victories gained. He pointed out how that, and noble were the motives which brought Italy into the war. He said:

"While complete in the national unity and making safe her frontiers, Italy took the part of peoples unfairly attacked, and added in the defence of liberty and justice against the violence and ambition of one far greater in strength of armaments. The prime cause of the victory of Italy and her allies may be found in the ideals actuating them."

After eulogizing Italy's effort and the services of the king and generals and army, he paid a tribute to the Allies.

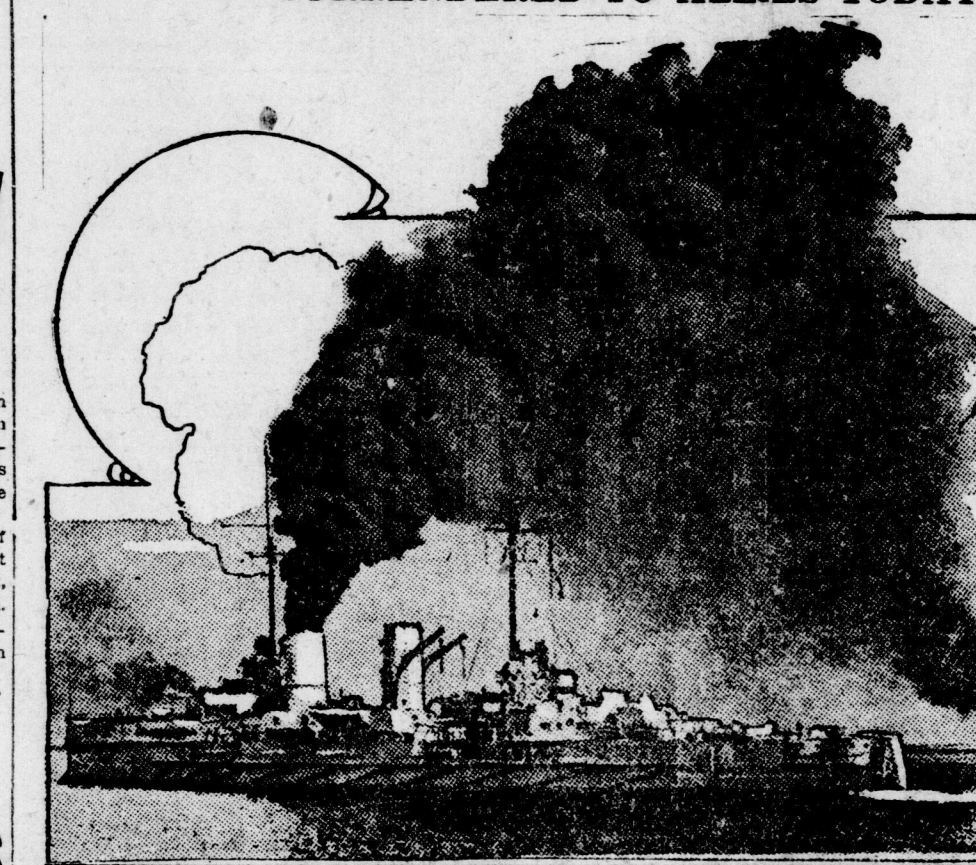
Will Go To French Capital at End of This Month.

CHINESE GOVT. WILL DESTROY \$14,000,000 WORTH OF OPIUM

Washington, Nov. 21.—Fourteen million dollars worth of opium purchased by the Chinese Government from foreign opium merchants at Shanghai is to be destroyed, according to a cablegram received here from Peking by the Chinese legation. The opium was purchased by the Government to prevent unscrupulous persons selling it to the Chinese people.

BRITISH WOMEN CAN NOW GO OVERSEAS

Sightseeing Tourists, Though, Will Not Be Permitted To Sail.

New York, Nov. 21.—The British consulate-general was directed yesterday by a cable dispatch from the foreign office in London to remove the restrictions in existence since April, 1917, preventing women who are British subjects from crossing the ocean to England, Scotland, Ireland, or Wales.

This did not apply, it was explained, to women who desired to visit Great Britain for sightseeing purposes, but referred only to those desiring to see their families abroad.

Cadets Will Not Continue To Train Unless They Wish

Orders Just Issued Apply To All Canadian Aviation Camps.

Montreal, Nov. 21.—Orders were yesterday issued by the Royal Canadian Air Force to the effect that no cadet was to continue his training in the air force unless he expressed his wish to continue.

The orders issued yesterday by the R. C. A. F. set forth that no cadet should leave for the air this morning until he had personally put in writing a statement that he wished on his own responsibility to continue his flying training for air service. This order will apply to all Canadian aviation camps in the R. C. A. F. in Canada.

\$223,000 RAISED AT MONTREAL FOR RED CROSS AND THE NAVY

Campaign Opens To Secure \$1,400,000 For League.

Montreal, Nov. 21.—Over \$223,000 for the Red Cross and Navy League was the result of the first of a three-days' drive begun yesterday. The campaign had only begun and Red Cross and Navy League workers are not disappointed over the day's showing, but they point out that during the next two days much larger sums must be raised if the drive is going to secure the objective set, of \$1,400,000.

LABOR MEN TO STRIKE UNLESS MOONEY GETS FREEDOM ON NEW TRIAL

Decision Is Made Unanimous at Meeting Held Last Night.

Seattle, Nov. 21.—By unanimous vote the Seattle Central Labor Council last night voted to strike on December 2 unless prior to that time Thomas J. Mooney, convicted of murder in connection with the San Francisco bomb explosion, had been granted a new trial or given his freedom. Immediate referendum vote on the strike resolution was asked on all labor unions affiliated with the council.

FUEL AND FOODSTUFFS REQUIRED IN AUSTRIA TO CHECK MISERY

Vienna, Tuesday, Nov. 19.—Dr. Karl, one of the three presidents of the national council of the German-Austrian Republic, said today that the most urgent need was for fuel and foodstuffs.

"What we must have in the next two weeks is coal and food," he declared, "otherwise the cold weather will increase the misery and possibly plunge our people into Bolshevism."

GERMANY'S GREATEST BATTLESHIPS AND FAST CRUISERS ARE HANDED OVER TODAY TO THE ALLIED FLEETS

DUTCH SOCIALIST SAYS THERE WILL BE NO REVOLUTION

Troelstra Claims Bolshevism Will Not Get Grip in Holland.

Rotterdam, Sunday, Nov. 17.—There is no revolution in Holland, nor is there likely to be. Pieter J. Troelstra, the Socialist leader, speaking today at a great labor congress here, not only repudiated violent methods, but admitted that his earlier bellicose utterances had resulted in a misunderstanding of his position. Extremists who would introduce Bolshevism are in a hopeless minority in Holland.

SERBIA RECOGNIZES GOVERNMENT OF THE JUGO-SLAVS

Premier Pachitch Appeals To Allied Nations To Take Similar Action.

Paris, Nov. 21.—Nikolai P. Pachitch, premier and minister of foreign affairs of Serbia, has sent a letter to Anton Korzop, president of the Jugo-Slav National Council, who is in this city to establish relations with the Entente governments in which he recognizes the name of the government of the Jugo-Slav National Council. He says it is the legitimate government of Serbian Croats and Slovenes living on lands formerly dominated by Austria-Hungary. Announcement is made in the Hungarian press that the Jugo-Slav National Council has sent a note to the Jugo-Slav National Council as a legitimate government.

STRIKE OF WINNIPEG POLICE IS AVERTED

Commissioners Agree To Give Grievances of Men Careful Consideration.

Winnipeg, Nov. 21.—For the time being at least the threatened strike of Winnipeg's police force has been averted, according to a statement issued last night by A. E. Taylor, president of the board of adjustment of the police force. At the conclusion of a meeting of that board last night, Mr. Taylor handed out the following statement:

"Our board called upon the police commissioners today and were favorably received. We detailed our grievances and promises were made that these should receive due consideration and the findings be communicated to us next week."

"The majority of the members of the board of police commissioners expressed surprise at certain features in connection with the state of affairs prevailing in the working conditions and stated that in their opinion there would be no difficulty in adjusting matters in the connection. The threatened strike of the police is for the time being averted owing to the decision of the board of commissioners to negotiate as had been desired with the police officers' board of adjustment."

ALLIES TO PROTEST TO DUTCH GOVERNMENT

Paris, Nov. 21.—The allied governments have decided to send an official protest to the Dutch Government against the violation of Holland's neutrality by the German troops to cross the Province of Limburg in their retreat from Belgium, according to the Echo de Paris.

TO MANUFACTURE AIRPLANES.

St. John, N. B., Nov. 21.—A company, a member of which is S. E. Elkin, M. P., is preparing to start airplane manufacturing in St. John, and carry on air transport between the Maritime Provinces and Upper Canada and the United States.

CITED IN FRENCH ORDERS.

Paris, Nov. 21.—British, American and Italian soldiers and units are cited in orders printed in the official Journal. The Prince of Wales Regiment is named for its service in Ison work.

Main German Fleet, Including Most Formidable Units of the Enemy Navy, Are Surrendered This Forenoon.

London, Nov. 21.—The German fleet, as specified in the terms of the armistice with Germany, was surrendered today to the Allies.

This announcement was made officially by the admiralty this afternoon. The statement reads: "The main German fleet surrendered at 9:30 o'clock this morning."

The names of the battleships, battle cruisers and light cruisers which have been surrendered to the Allies have not been announced officially. However, a telegram received in Amsterdam from Berlin Sunday gave this list:

Battleships—Kaiser, 24,113 tons; Kaiserin, 24,113 tons; Koenig Albert, 24,113 tons; Kronprinz Wilhelm, 25,000 tons; Prinz Regent Luitpold, 24,113 tons; Markgraf, 25,293 tons; Grosser Kurfuerst, 25,293 tons; Bayern, 28,000 tons; Koenig, 25,293 tons, and Friedrich der Grosse, 24,113 tons.

Battle Cruisers—Hindenburg, about 27,000 tons; Derflinger, 28,000 tons; Seydlitz, 25,000 tons; Moltke, 23,000 tons, and Von der Tann 18,800 tons.

Light Cruisers—Bremen, 4,000 tons; Brummer, 4,000 tons; Frankfurt, 5,400 tons; Koeln, tonnage uncertain; Dresden, tonnage uncertain, and Emden, 5,400 tons.

400 ALLIED SHIPS WERE READY WHEN GERMANS GAVE UP FLEET

London, Nov. 21.—The British grand fleet, accompanied by an American battle squadron and French cruisers, steamed out at 3 o'clock this morning from its Scottish base to accept the surrender of the German battleships, battle cruisers and destroyers.

The point of rendezvous for the allied and German sea forces was between 30 and 40 miles east of May Island, opposite the Firth of Forth.

The fog which had enveloped the grand fleet for three days cleared last night, and this morning the weather was dull with a slight haze hanging over the Firth of Forth.

The fleet which witnessed the surrender consisted of some 400 ships, including 60 dreadnoughts, 50 light cruisers and nearly 500 destroyers. Admiral Sir David Beatty, commander of the grand fleet, was on the Queen Elizabeth.

KING GEORGE AND QUEEN MARY WITNESSED DEPARTURE OF SHIPS

Rothesay, Scotland, Nov. 21.—King George and Queen Mary entertained the British, French and American admirals today on board Admiral Beatty's flagship. They witnessed the departure of the fast destroyers which formed the vanguard of the fleet.

The King and Queen reviewed the entire grand fleet, and was received everywhere with tremendous enthusiasm.

ADDITIONAL BUILDINGS CONNECTED WITH WESTMINSTER HOSPITAL TO COST ABOUT QUARTER OF MILLION

Local Contractors To Have Full Opportunity To Tender on Contracts—All Construction To Be Veneered With Milton Pressed Brick.

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—Further buildings in connection with Westminster Military Hospital, for which tenders will be asked early, comprise: Isolation hospital, cost probably \$50,000; physiotherapy and recreation buildings, costing about \$150,000; guard house at entrance to grounds, all of which will be fenced, also rest station building on the Port Stanley Railway. Arrangements confirmed will give London contractors the fullest opportunity to tender on all contracts.

It has been practically determined that all of the buildings will be brick veneered with Milton pressed brick, thus adding materially to their beauty as well as permanency. Two convenient wards, for which contracts already have been let, are to be used instead as nurses' and orderlies' wards respectively, each with separate service buildings. The termination of the contract for the transfer convalescents to the sanatorium and institutions under direction of the soldiers' civil re-establishment commission, such as Whitby and Guelph throughout the Dominion. Later should necessity require it, further accommodation and buildings will be added to Westminster hospital.

FRENCH TROOPS TO ENTER BUDAPEST

Gen. Herry To Command the Forces Going Into Germany.

Paris, Wednesday, Nov. 20.—French troops, under command of Gen. Herry, will enter Budapest tomorrow. It is believed the French forces arrived at Constantinople today. A most enthusiastic welcome was given to French soldiers when they marched into Zabern.

FRANCE WILL BUILD BIG MERCHANT FLEET

Ships With Capacity of Six Million Tons To Be Ready In Five Years.

Paris, Nov. 21.—Fernand Boutezon, undersecretary of state for merchant marine, announces that within five years France will have merchant ships with a total capacity of six million tons, which is double its pre-war tonnage, according to the Matin. It is said that the greater part of this fleet will be composed of new vessels.

LOWER PRICES IN FRANCE.

Paris, Nov. 21.—There has been a notable lowering of prices here in the recent past. The price of grain from North America has dropped nearly 50 per cent. Wool from South America now costs 250 francs per cubic metre instead of 350, the former price.
