As the royal automobile came in sight the cheers began to swell forth, and when the prince drove through the lines. when the prince drove through the lines when the prince drove through the lines made in the waiting thousands the cheering was repeated again and again until it drowned the playing of the National Anthem by the bands of the G. G. F. G. and G. W. V. A.

Crowd Too Large.

Although the reception was timed to end at 4 o'clock it was not until half past four that the doors of the city hall were closed, and then Mayor Fisher, with the aid of a megaphone, succeeded in any propulations that as the Fisher, with the aid of a megaphone, succeeded in announcing that as the prince found it impossible to shake hands with everyone, he was coming outside to speak to the waiting crowds. Immediately afterwards his royal highness appeared on the steps of the city hall and the cheers broke forth anew. Men, women and children shouted their welcome and appreciation of the friendly, good fellowship of the heir to the throne, and while he waited for the cheers to subside the prince leaned over the edge of the crowd and shook hands with all whom he could reach.


