DIDN'T KNOW SHE WAS ILL
Uncle and Aunt Testify at Hissard
Inquest.
WHITBY, Dec. 10.—(Special).—After
an all-day session the inquest into the
death of Miss Ida May Hissard was
this afternoon adjourned till Dec. 23,
when her parents and others will tes-
tify.
The case is a peculiar one. The girl
had gone to the home of her uncle,
John Wilson, a farmer, near Claremont,
who had a child ill with scarlet
fever. Miss Hissard assisted in at-
tending the patient. In a week's time,
it is alleged, she showed signs of ill-
ness, whereupon Wilson prepared to
send her home. He spoke to Charles
Brodie, the health inspector for the
district, who said her clothes would
have to be fumigated and that she
would have to take a bath. This was
done, and half an hour later the girl
was being driven by her uncle to Myr-
tles, where she got a train for Whitby.
Evidence was given to-day by In-
spector Brodie, his brother, Dr. Bro-
die, and Mr. and Mrs. Wilson. The
latter denied that they knew the girl
was sick, altho it seems a rash had
appeared. Wilson admitted that the
girl had complained of a headache
before being driven to the train.
It is said that when she arrived here
she was seen to stagger while walking
home. She died a few days later.

CINCINNATI, Dec. 10.—The name
of Edgar S. Cooke of Chicago was
legally connected to-day with the
\$643,000 shortage in the local office

WAR ON LORDS

IRISH HOME RULE
Continued From Page 1.
after years of debate and the govern-
ment, as a result, was confronted with
three constitutional innovations, first the
claim of the house of lords to control
levying taxation; second, the claim
of the same house to the right to com-
pel dissolution of the popular chamber,
and third, the assertion of the house of
lords of their power to make and un-
make the executive government of the
country.

"What had been done," declared Mr.
Asquith, "may be done again. It be-
comes my first duty to make this re-
currence impossible. We shall, therefore,
demand authority from the electorate
to translate an ancient unwritten us-
age into an act of parliament and to
place upon the statute book, recogni-
tion explicit and complete of the settled
doctrine of our constitution, that it is
beyond the province of the house of
lords to meddle with any law to any
degree or for any purpose connected with
national finance."

WON'T SUBMIT TO HUMILIATION.
The premier said that neither he nor
any other Liberal minister supported
by a majority in the house of common
was going to submit again to the rebuffs
and humiliations of the last four years.
They would not assume office unless
they could secure safeguards which ex-
pressly showed that the functions of
the legislative unity and honor of their
party.

The Liberal party, Mr. Asquith de-
clared, was not opposing the abolition
of the house of lords or the setting up
of a single chamber, but it asked the
electorate that the house of lords should
be confined to the functions proper to
the second chamber and that the abso-
lute control of the finances by the
house was unanimous, he said, in demand-
ing the absolute control of the finances by
the house of commons, the maintenance
of free trade and of an effective cur-
tailment or limitation of the powers of
the house of lords.
