Captain of Swedish Schooner

Says Submarine Fired Ship,

Then Sank It.

STOCKHOLM, via London, May 13. —The captain of the Swedish schoon-er. Harald, gives in the "Dagens Ny-heter" an account of the sinking of his ship by a German submarine in the North Sea on May 5. The ship was halted by the submarine, the com-mander of which gave the crew fifteen minutes in which to abandon the schooner. The captain of the Harald refused to obey the order and hoisted the Swedish flag. The Germans then boarded the schooner and poured pet-troleum over the ship, which they lighted. They then attacked the cap-tain with cutlasses, forcing him into a small boat. The blazing petroleum not destroying the Harald quick enough, the ship was sunk by gunfire from the submarine.





