31,380 ralmost nothing, as a large expenditure would be necessary before any return Could be got from it. To sell this portion (if the Indians would Consent) would of Course, Considerably increase the Annuity, but it would make it necessary to reduce the Size of the farms on the Reserve far too much. at present there is no more land on this Reserve than might be used to advantage by the Indians on it. The lots are quite small snough for moderate sizes farmed; and I think it would be unwise to divide them up. Except to the ages & infirm, widows with Amall Children Ve. The amunity is really of little Consequence. Jaften think that those who are able to work would in many Cases, be better without it. They trust too much to it, and do not exect themselves to obtain money from other dances. I have thought of Some such Scheme as the Gallowing - Let a Competent Engineer be employed to take levels so as to shew where leading ditches would be necessary through the whole Reserve. Let such ditches be opened at an effence of probably from \$6000. to \$8,000. Whink at any rate, the latter named Sum would be sufficient to Constant main ditches to that all the lands on the Reserve might be drained into theme. Then Suppose - Day \$ 100. from the Share Capital of each individual was set apart for cleaning up and improving the different farms - the work for the most part to be done by the Indians themselves, under Competent Supervision. This would
