

TWO WEDDINGS TODAY OF INTEREST TO ST. JOHN

A very pretty home wedding and one which has been looked forward to with interest in local society circles, took place at 3.30 this afternoon at the residence of Howard D. Troop, Orange street, when his daughter, Miss Josephine Smith Troop, was married to Charles E. McPherson, general passenger agent of the western line of the C. P. R.

The ceremony was performed in the presence of relatives and friends of the contracting parties, by Rev. Dr. Sprague, pastor of Centenary, assisted by Rev. G. M. Campbell, of Queen Square Methodist church.

The bride looked charming in a beautiful gown of princess lace over white tulle, with a veil of point lace, the whole being a wedding gift from an aunt. She was attended only by Miss Jennie McLaughlin, who wore a white and black costume of point d'esprit lace with pink trimming and carried a shower bouquet of pink roses. The bridesmaid wore a white tulle dress with a gold and white sash.

LATE LOCALS

Fifty-six cases of the customs house today from western ports to go forward in winter port steamers.

Miss Bertha Bartsch, who has been visiting her mother since last September, left for her home in Oakland, California, by last evening's train. A very large number of her friends were at the depot to see her off.

Between 11 and 12 o'clock last night a man named Johnson fell on Charlotte street, badly injuring his face. He was taken into Paddock's drug store and subsequently removed to the Victoria Hotel, where he is stopping.

D. L. Hutchinson, of the weather observatory, this city, reports that 3 1/2 inches of snow fell yesterday, which is unusual for this time of year. Today around the city the walking is very bad and rubber boots are at a premium.

Today being St. Wednesday, Tenessee will be changed in the Cathedral, Holy evening at 8 o'clock. Tomorrow, Holy Thursday, the blessing of the oils will take place during mass at 10 o'clock. A large number of priests from the different parishes in the St. John diocese will arrive today to be present at the blessing of the oils.

Joseph Murphy, who was arrested for vagrancy a couple of weeks ago and sentenced to three months in the almshouse, escaped from the latter place on Monday afternoon. This morning Officer Ross Sullivan nabbed Joe in the market and took him to the central station. The almshouse team will take Murphy back this afternoon to serve out his sentence.

This morning a Times reporter found the new candidate standing near the head of King street, smoking his pipe, and making a remarkable canvass, the efforts of which caused him to perspire freely.

LUMBERING IN MAINE

Judging from a letter received here from a St. John man who is engaged in lumbering near Oldtown, Maine, lumbering prospects in that vicinity are good. At the present time there are many stream driven lodges, as the ice in the rivers and streams holds at 15 to 18 inches. There will be snow in the Maine woods as late as June, for three and a half feet fell during March. If warm rains come the expectation is that all the lumber hung up last year will come out, and there is a prospect of water in the streams.

The writer of the letter says that a large dam is being built on the Penobscot River, in the vicinity of Oldtown, by which hydraulic power will be obtained to run a large electric plant.
