President John K. Tener, of the National League, said at New York Tuesday that he will submit to the joint rules day that he will submit to the joint rules committee, which meets next month, a recommendation to increase the width of the home plate from seventeen to eighteen inches and send a batsman to first base on three balls instead of four. Such a change in the rules, he declared, would be removed the home grounds prior to the balance too much in favor of abolishing exhibition games by major clubs on their home grounds prior to the batter." 




