### BABES WEEK OLD AND UPWARD SEPARATED FROM MOTHERS

Hundreds of Infants Sent Back to Switzerland Cannot be Identified

Paris, April 19.—William T. P. Hollingsworth, representative of the Westinghouse interests in France, has returned from Schaffhausen and Zurich, where he investigated the conditions of returning civilian prisoners on behalf of the American Clearing House for Relief.

The most extraordinary point in Mr. Hollingsworth's report is that the trains bring 100 babies, a week old and upward daily. These are unclothed but are wrapped in fragments of skirts and shawls. There is no means of tracking their identity. Mothers returning with their children say they received no medical attention at childbirth. Swiss women are supplying babies' clothing at the railway stations for the unfortunate. Many of the older children who have arrived also cannot be identified.

The Swiss began supplying money and food for the returning prisoners and babies, but their funds were insufficient to continue the work. They are now placing the babies in the hands of station platforms for the washing of clothing. The released prisoners seem cowed and unwilling to describe the treatment they received in Germany.

### TO TAKE GRAVEL FROM FORESHORES

Road Supervisors Given Authority  
Under Amendment to Highway

Fredericton, April 18.—The legislature met this afternoon at three o'clock.

Hon. Mr. Morrissey introduced bills relating to the St. John Suspension bridge, to amend the Highways Act and to amend the act authorizing the making of loans for the Normal School extension.

Hon. Mr. Baxter introduced a bill to amend the Bills of Sale Act, which he said was to enable a portion of the goods comprised in a bill of sale to be discharged from its operation.

Hon. Mr. Landry presented the annual report of the provincial board of health, and a statement of the bonded indebtedness of Madawaska.

Mr. Tilley asked about the section permitting the taking of stone and gravel from the shore.

Hon. Mr. Baxter explained that it was intended chiefly for the benefit of the parish of Lancaster and was to give the road supervisors permission to take material for repairs to the Manawagashish road. He said that they would only take the material from places where it

### RECENT DEATHS

The death occurred yesterday of Mrs. Ellen Lynch at her residence, 39 Clarence street. She leaves her husband, John Lynch, two sons, John E. and Francis J., of this city, and five daughters—Miss Nellie, Mrs. James Pilling, Mrs. Joseph Stewart and Mrs. Regan, all in Connecticut, and Miss Edith, at home. The late Mrs. Lynch was a native of England. The funeral has been arranged for the residence tomorrow afternoon.

James Murphy, aged fifty-nine years, was found dead in his room in the Western House, West St. John, yesterday morning. He had been indisposed for a fortnight, but his case was not regarded as serious. When found he was lying on the floor, fully attired with the exception of his coat. Dr. Kenney de-

R. on the West Side docks, and has been coming to St. John every winter for the last fifteen years. He was well known about the harbor front, his weight of 300 pounds making him a conspicuous figure.
