I OCAL pustoms officials descended on Lornevill last evening by motor boat and made the largest seizure of contraband liquor in the history of the local service, it was learned today. The wet goods consisted of about 500 cases of assorted brands of the best whiskies and gins, and were stored in a large shed near the short. The liquor is valued at more than \$15,000. A tug

As a result of several days hard work by four customs officers information regarding the locality of this large consignment of liquor, which had been landed from a rum runner off the coast, it was said, was secured and it was decided to start last evening for

SHED FOUND DESERTED Three of the officers in a large motor boat left about 7 o'clock and reached Lorneville an hour later. The officers hurried ashore and found the shed deserted. On securing entry it was said that the first sight to greet them was a large pile of empty barrels which were piled in such a way as to conceal the cases of liquor. This shed is situated a short distance up from the Lorne-

Lockhart by telephone, and he ordered a tug of the Saint John Drydock and Shipbuilding Co. Ltd. to go down and bring up the large ship-ment. One of the tugs put out about midnight, but owing to the rough weather she was forced to return. She went down again early this morning, but owing to the condition of the tide, which will only permit the vessel to go close to where the liquor was stored at high tide, the tug returned.
