

FEW CHANGES ARE REGISTERED IN MONTREAL

Prices Remain Generally
Strong in Active
Issues.

CONSOLIDATED SMELTERS LEAD

Many Buying Orders for
Oil Shares Received in
New York.

MONTREAL, July 24.—There were no outstanding price changes at the opening of today's stock market but the strength of yesterday was generally continued. Consolidated Smelters was the most active issue, advancing 1/2 to 89 1/2. Next in activity came Canadian, which was down 1/4 at 89 1/2. Revival of interest in this old time leader is attributed to strength in the market, which yesterday advanced to 11.80. Another prominent stock this morning was Dominion Textile, up 1/4 to 84 1/2. The papers were represented by Price Bros., unchanged at 47 1/2, and Laurentide up 1 to 80. Asbestos common and preferred both received some attention, the former easing 1/4 to 72 1/2, and the latter, after opening off 1 at 100, rising to its closing figure.

The only other stocks to appear during the early trading were Winnipeg Ralls, Twin City and British Empire Steel first preferred all of which sold in small lots only at 30 1/2, down 1/4, at 62, off 1/2, and at 28 1/2, up the fraction, respectively.

Morning Stock Letter

NEW YORK, July 24.—The market yesterday showed it still had ability to recover. Right from the opening buying seemed to be larger and better than the selling and nearly all groups were affected. Just at the close the high-priced issues moved forward rapidly, while the general list was active but gained no ground. Whether this action of market near the close indicated that there was some distribution under cover of strength in American Can and Mack Truck needs more time to demonstrate. A continuation of this strength in high-priced issues, without the general market being able to advance would make us afraid of market. We rather expect higher prices for the market leaders, the steel, coppers, some rails and some specialties. The Bethlehem Steel report shows that trade conditions are much improved over last year, and indications point to a much better third quarter than we had last year. Believe steel stocks can be bought. So. Ry. is in high ground, but we think it is going higher.

Brokers' Opinions

NEW YORK, July 24.—Foreblosser and Wacker.—"Think it would be a mistake to assume a bearish attitude simply because a two day reaction has occurred. Following seven days advance. Would not be afraid to make commitments, especially in low priced rails and coppers during any further selling."

Housman & Co.—"On weakness market will be a purchase, especially the steel."

Hutton & Co.—"The plentiful supply of money and the difficulty in securing stocks affording a good yield do not justify the sale of stocks bought in the earlier stages of the market."

Block Maloney.—"After some further readjustment the market will be ready for another forward swing. We would use weak spots to buy all sound issues."

HANDCUFF KING CALLED TO COURT

Complainant Says Houdini Was
Disorderly in Place of
Business.

NEW YORK, July 24.—City Magis-
trate James M. Barrett has issued a
summons charging Harry Houdini, "the
handcuff king" with disorderly con-
duct. The complainant is George

Young of the Francis P. Houdina Com-
pany of 1476 Broadway.
Houdini, it is alleged, entered the
company's office last Monday, and
charged the officers of the company
with using his name unlawfully in the
conduct of their business. He tore
from a packing case a tag addressed
"Houdini," the complaint says, and
when ordered to return it, refused,
seized a chair and broke an electric
chandelier when they tried to prevent
him from leaving the room.
Mr. Houdini said that for some time
he has been getting bills and letters
intended for the Houdina concern, and
that he believed the confusion of names
was intentional. He seized the chair,
he said, to protect himself from attack
when he tried to leave the office.
Francis P. Houdina, who is described
as an electrical engineer and inventor,
is the head of the Houdina Company.
He said that there had never been any
intention on his part to capitalize the
name of Houdini.
