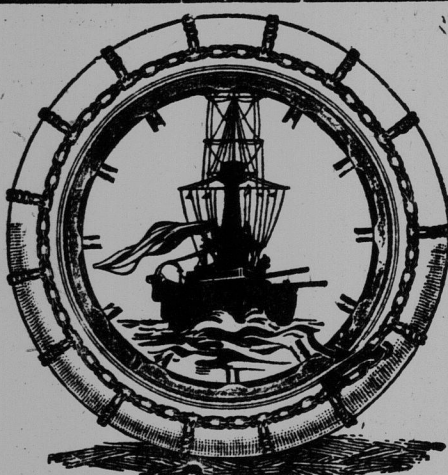

DEATH OF TIMOTHY LYNCH.
Many friends were sorry to learn of
the death of Timothy Lynch, which oc-
curred yesterday in Riverview. He had

where he was well thought of by all

TRAFFIC CASES.
A. E. Everett, charged with driving

of the Westmain road, pleaded not
guilty. Policeman Bette testified that

RED CROSS WORK

Reports at Meeting of the
Hospital Committee To-
day.

A meeting of the Provincial Red
Cross Hospital Committee was held this
morning. Mrs. J. V. Anglin in the
chair.

A letter was read from the Parker
Hospital, Boston, Mass., regarding
a patient there who received treatment
in our hospitals. The letter also re-
ferred to some financial assistance given
two patients on leaving the hospital by
the local society.

Mrs. E. R. Taylor reported that there
were now 80 patients in the D. S. C. H.
hospital at Lancaster and spoke of the
great need of books for the library there.
Mrs. E. R. Barbour was appointed to
look after collecting books.

Mrs. W. P. Bonnell gave a report from
the buying committee of the hospital.
Mrs. James Doody said that forty-
two men from the East St. John hospital
had been taken for automobile rides this
month. It was decided that the drives
would be continued on the fine days in
November.

Mrs. W. D. Forster, for the follow up
committee, reported two cases for
which assistance was given.

It was decided to give a special Hal-
loween treat to the patients at River
Glade, Lancaster and East St. John. A
Christmas treat was discussed and the
secretary was asked to send out notices
to the various branches of the Red Cross
Society in the province asking for aid in
the filling of stockings. It was estimat-
ed that about 150 stockings would be
required.

Mrs. W. H. Shaw reported for the
visiting committee at the East St. John
hospital and especially mentioned a
contribution of flowers and scrap books
sent.

PROBATE COURT

In the probate court before Judge
McNerney, at present adjourned, probate
granted in the County of Middlesex,
Mass., were issued in the matter of the
estate of Mrs. M. C. McColgan. Personally
in this province was probated at \$5,000.
The will was proved, showing the ap-
pointment of his wife, Isabelle M. Mc-
Colgan as executrix and chief beneficiary,
and also making a bequest of \$8,000 to
his sister, Mary H. McColgan, 137 Queen
street, St. John, after a gift of \$20,000
to his wife was satisfied. Ancillary pro-
bate was granted to Mrs. McColgan, J.
C. Belyea was proctor.

In the matter of the estate of Mary
C. Ellis, personally \$2,000, letters of ad-
ministration were granted to Robert R.
Melvin. J. J. Stothart was proctor.

OPEN TENDERS FOR CITY BONDS

Bids at City Hall for Issue of
\$646,000—Referred to the
Mayor, Chamberlain and
Controller.

Thomas, Armstrong & Bell, a local
brokerage firm, was one of three firms
which jointly offered the highest bid for
an issue of \$646,000 City of St. John
bonds, tenders for which were opened at
a special meeting of the common coun-
cil this morning. This firm, together
with the Royal Securities Corporation,
Ltd., and Johnston and Ward, offered
\$97,876, provided acceptance of the ten-
der was made on or before October 28.
The issue is of six per cent debentures,
dated November 1, 1921, and due No-
vember 1, 1931, the proceeds to pay for
city public works which have already
been completed. It is part of an issue
of \$820,000 recently authorized, the bal-
ance of \$174,000 to be taken up by the
city sinking fund.

Other tenders were as follows:
Joint bid of Eastern Securities Cor-
poration, Ames & Co., Gundy & Co.,
Wood, Wood, and J. M. Robinson &
Sons, \$97,81, for immediate acceptance.
W. F. Mahon & Co., Halifax, \$97,21.
Dominion Securities Corporation, \$2,61.
This offer was made on the condition
that the city refrain from issuing more
bonds within sixty days of the issue of
this block without the consent of the
tender.

The tenders were referred to the may-
or, the city chamberlain and controller
with power to act.

CITY HALL WILL HAVE ELEVATOR

Contracts Awarded at Special
Council Meeting—Total
Cost About \$14,500—Work
for City Carpenters.

At a special meeting of the common
council this morning contracts for the
erection of an electric elevator and steel
stairway in city hall were awarded re-
spectively to T. Turnbull Elevator Co.,
Ltd., and the Canadian Welding Works,
Ltd., both of Montreal. The cost of in-
stallation will total \$14,500, and extras
are estimated at \$3,000. Payment of the
total by bond issue was authorized by
a unanimous vote of the council.
The council went into committee to
hear a report of the city engineer and
city electrician. They reported that the
revised tenders had been received as fol-
lows: For the elevator—Otis, Fensom
Elevator Co., \$8,998, and Turnbull Ele-
vator Co., \$9,341, including sales tax.
Should the city pay the sales tax on the
Otis Fensom elevator an additional cost
of \$140.10 would have to be paid. For
the steel stairs—Canadian Welding
Works, \$2,215, and John Watson & Co.,
\$2,400.

On motion of Commissioner Thomp-
son, it was decided to accept the lowest
tender. The city engineer said that the
work could be completed in about six
weeks, and would necessitate the moving
of only two pipes in the heating appar-
atus. He said that the city carpenters
could look after the removal of the
present stairs and the other work out-
side the actual installation.
The committee went into council and
confirmed the action of the committee.
To Commissioner Bullock, Mr. Thomp-
son said that the matter of recent in-
surance on the elevator could be attend-
ed to after the erection was completed.

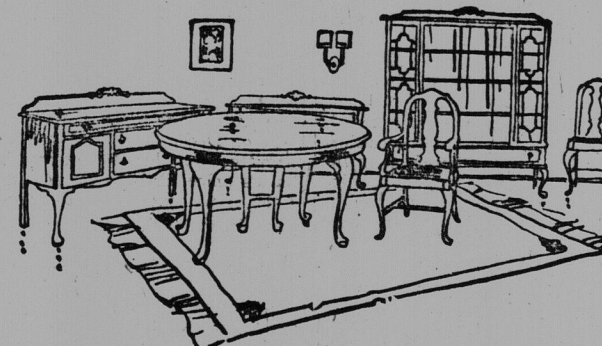
